### **Homework assignment summary**

After the first day of the course you will need to submit a 500-word **opinion article** on a topic of your choice. Literally, anything.

This could be something you have prepared ahead of the course. The deadline for submission is **7pm UK time Saturday 7**<sup>th</sup> **October**. Please email the finished piece as a Word doc to ehsan.h.masood@gmail.com

### Please keep to the deadline and word length.

Workshop tutors Ehsan Masood and John Whitfield will assess your work before the Sunday session starts. We will then divide into two small groups and you will be asked to read your article aloud, with an opportunity for feedback from the tutors and the rest of the group.

Your article could be for a UK or international newspaper or a website. Or it could be for a science magazine, such as *New Scientist*; or a publication read mostly by researchers, such as *Research Professional News*.

In addition to your 500-word opinion article please also include the following:

- A headline and standfirst (the short description below the headline).
- The name of your intended publication.
- Two sentences on how you would pitch your opinion article to an editor. In your pitch, you must say (i) what is your topline and what is distinctive about your argument or point of view and (ii) why you are the person that readers need to hear from.

Important tip: we want you to **read your article aloud**. This means please practise a few times ideally with someone listening. If a sentence or an idea doesn't *sound* right to a listener, it won't sound right to a reader either!
