Our impact

Last month we published our Impact Report for the 2023-24 financial year, during which we supported:

130 women and birthing people in prisons in England131 women and birthing people in the community in London & the South East

Each year we ask the women and birthing people we support to provide us with feedback. Of those who gave us feedback in 2023/24:

100% said our support had helped improve their mental wellbeing
98% said our support helped them to feel more valued and respected
94% said we had helped them to feel less isolated
93% said our services helped them feel more confident in making decisions for themselves and their babies
100% said our support had helped them to give their babies a better start in life

Earlier this month, we launched our new Taking a Strand campaign, working with leading barristers at family law chambers 4PB and solicitors at MSB to call for an end to the overreliance on hair strand testing in the family courts. There is a compelling body of evidence that shows the processes used to interpret hair strand drug test results are vastly oversimplified and misleading, and that they hold a significant risk of racial bias.

"Without urgent and comprehensive review of the way this evidence is presented and interpreted in court proceedings, there is significant risk that many more children will be wrongly removed from their families: a most devastating form of injustice."

As part of this campaign, we sent an open letter to the Family Division and the Family Justice Board, calling on them to undertake an urgent review of the use of these tests. Sent with over 90 co-signatories, from more than 20 different organisations, our letter received coverage on the Bureau of Investigative Journalism and in the Observer; and prompted a direct response from President of the Family Division, Sir Andrew McFarlane. MBRRACE maternal deaths reports 2024: Reflections events

Following the publication of the latest MBRRACE report on maternal deaths last month, Birth Companions held two online reflections events, to allow us to collectively reflect on some of the key inequities highlighted in this year's report; the care of pregnant and postnatal women who have social services' involvement, and the experiences of pregnant and postnatal women who have recently migrated. Both sessions are now available to watch online: **Session 1 - The 2024 MBRRACE report and children's social care involvement** We were joined for this event by Kaat De Backer, NIHR Research Fellow in Maternal and Perinatal Mental Health at King's College London.

Funding news

We're delighted to have received a significant funding grant from City Bridge Foundation in recent weeks, as part of their Suicide Prevention fund. This generous grant will help fund our community services in London and is a brilliant recognition of the potential our support has for reducing maternal suicide, which remains the leading direct cause of death between six weeks and a year after birth (MBRRACE-UK, 2024).

We also recently received a grant from the Evan Cornish Foundation, which will fund the first phase of our new, collaborative programme of policy and influencing work focussing on improving the health and care experiences of migrant perinatal women. We'll be sharing more news on that soon!

Giving HOPE Project – Hackney launch event



The Giving HOPE project, a collaboration between Lancaster University and Birth Companions, aims to reduce the trauma experienced by mothers and babies who are separated soon after birth. At the centre of the project are the HOPE Boxes, coproduced with a group of women with lived experience of maternal separation (the HOPE Mothers), and underpinned by findings from the *Born into Care* project.

HOPE Boxes have now been rolled out in over 30 areas of the country, and last week Birth Companions staff and HOPE Mothers attended the official launch at Homerton University Hospital in East London. The event was attended by midwives, health professionals and social workers, with speeches from senior leaders in local maternity and children's social care services. Kate Chivers, Birth Companions' Head of Engagement, led a Q&A with two of the HOPE mothers, who spoke movingly about the items in the boxes, and how and why they were chosen.

Scenes from Lost Mothers



Birth Companions is delighted to announce that bookings are now open for a new Clean Break play, *Scenes from Lost Mothers*, which brings to life the findings of the groundbreaking Lost Mothers research project, led by Dr Laura Abbott at the University of Hertfordshire. Birth Companions staff and members of our Lived Experience Team have played a central role in shaping the Lost Mothers project from the very outset, exploring the multiple challenges faced by women who are compulsorily separated from their babies within the prison system.
