The biopsy ruled out cancer and further tests eventually confirmed coccidiomycosis. A horrible misdiagnosis lay behind her and a death sentence avoided by the skin of her teeth.

But how many patients would have believed their doctors in this situation and how many would have had the treatment recommended? And for how many would it have proved lethal?

There's another twist to Suzanne Somer's story. Her husband also developed multiple symptoms, despite a healthy lifestyle, including chronic sinus infections, twitching and eye watering. He required multiple trips to the hospital for intravenous antibiotics. His health took a downward spiral. Eventually the culprit was found. It turned out to be a mould. A room in the basement of their house had become waterlogged and developed black mould. This was then spread throughout the house via the air-conditioning system.
