


DAMA Scotland Meetup November 3rd 2020



Summary

Consultation on the framework National Data Strategy (NDS).

This consultation closes at **11:45pm on 2 December 2020**

The consultation on the framework National Data Strategy (NDS) was launched during London Tech Week 2020 to explore whether or not the strategy appropriately reflects the opportunities and challenges of our hyper-digital world and considers all relevant priorities, potential trade-offs and decisions. Building on the considered, evidence-based approach used in developing the NDS, the consultation seeks to ensure that the framework strategy has set the right overall direction and approach, as reflected in questions 1-4. It also seeks to ensure that the strategy's missions, associated areas of focus, and policy proposals have received proper scrutiny and input, as reflected in questions 5-19.

The consultation will run for a total of 12 weeks, allowing sufficient time for thoughtful consideration; we welcome responses from organisations and individuals across the UK. The government's response to the consultation, which will be published in early 2021, will be based on careful consideration of all submitted responses. Subject to the consultation's findings, further consultation may be necessary on the details of any potential changes to current framework strategy.


