Burden of Chikungunya Fever and Its Economic and Social Impacts Worldwide

Vaneide Daciane Pedí et al., TMIH, July 2025

KEY POINTS

- Global reach: More than 10 million cases between 2010-2023, with outbreaks across Africa, Asia, the Americas, and Europe.
- Economic toll: Direct costs ranged from US\$ 3.5 million (US Virgin Islands) to US\$ 83.6 billion (Americas, 2013-2015). Indirect costs from productivity loss often exceeded 50% of the total burden.
- Long-term impact: Up to 50% of patients develop chronic disabilities, leading to marked declines in quality of life.
- Comparison: The burden of chikungunya now surpasses dengue and yellow fever in several regions.
- Policy gap: Despite its scale, chikungunya remains under-researched and underfunded.

This Review synthesised 43 studies (2009-2023) covering cost-of-illness (direct, indirect, out-ofpocket), program costs (vector control), burden-of-disease, cost-effectiveness/utility, and 15 QoL studies.

Notable figures

- Program costs: Vector control from US\$ 0.9-1.5 M/year (Greece) to US\$ 466 M (Brazil, 2016).
- Healthcare use: Large shares of direct medical costs come from hospitalisation and diagnostics; family out-of-pocket spending is substantial, with catastrophic expenditures reported in Indian outbreaks.
- Work loss: Typical absenteeism ranges 1-35 days per case; several contexts attribute >80 % of total costs to productivity loss.

Why it matters

Chikungunya is no longer a "mild, self-limiting" tropical disease. Its chronic sequelae, economic drag on households and health systems, and climate-/globalisation-driven expansion make it a priority for preparedness.

Implications for practice & policy

- Invest early: Preventive larvicide/adulticide deployments can be cost-effective and outbreakmitigating; integrate with community engagement.
- Measure better: Standardise economic evaluations, include CHIKF in GBD updates, and derive disease-specific disability weights (acute and chronic).
- Protect households: Track and reduce catastrophic health spending; plan social protection for long-term disability.

TWAS Fellowships for Research and Advanced Training

The World Academy of Sciences (TWAS) offers fellowships to young scientists from developing countries to strengthen research capacity and foster South-South collaboration. Fellows spend 3-12 months at a research institution in another developing country, gaining advanced training and building long-term links for cooperation.

Key Details:

- Deadline: 6 October 2025
- Eligibility: MSc or higher; citizens of a developing country; employed at a research institution in a developing country
- Fields: Natural sciences
- Support: International low-cost airfare + monthly subsistence (up to USD 300). Host institutions provide accommodation, food, and research facilities.
- Preference: Early-career scientists, especially from Least Developed Countries

Note: Fellowships are for South-South exchanges only (no placements in China under this programme). Applications must be submitted via the TWAS online portal.

TWAS Visiting Expert Programme

This programme allows institutions in developing countries, especially Least Developed Countries, to host internationally renowned scientists for short visits. The goal is to build longterm collaborations, strengthen local research capacity, and support training activities.

Key Details:

- Deadline: 6 October 2025
- Eligibility: Host institutions in developing countries may invite experts (PhD. internationally recognised) in natural sciences other than physics and mathematics
- Duration: 2-4 weeks
- Support: TWAS covers international economy airfare; the host institution provides accommodation, food, and research facilities
- Note: Nominations of women experts are particularly encouraged

During the visit, experts are expected to deliver lectures, supervise students, collaborate in research, and support the development of new programmes.

- Strong commitment to both academic study and contribution to EIT project work

Application Timeline:

- Applications open: 1 September 2025
- First deadline: 1 October 2025 → conditional scholarship decisions (Dec 2025)
- Second deadline: 1 December 2025 → conditional scholarship decisions (Jan 2026)
- Final deadline: 1 February 2026 → conditional scholarship decisions (Mar 2026)
- Scholars announced: April 2026
- Studies begin: October 2026

Note: Applicants must apply both to the Ellison Scholars Programme and independently through the University of Oxford's admissions process.

- Deadline: 29 September 2025, 17:00 GMT
- Who can apply: Nationals/residents of LMICs in the WHO Africa Region, <40 years at application, employed by a university/research institute/ministry of health/public health institution/NGO in Africa (legal entity required)
- Track & duration: Up to 6 months (programme implementers) or 12 months (academics/researchers); start January 2026
- Language: English (Bachelor's degree completed in English required)
- Focus areas (TDR Strategy 2024-2029): Control/elimination of infectious diseases of poverty; resistance to treatment/control agents; epidemics & outbreaks; climate change & health (One Health)

Eligibility & Profile

- Education: TDR MPH/MSc in Public Health/IR (or equivalent MSc with IR focus)
- Experience: 3-5 years post-Master's in academia or health systems; ≥1 peer-reviewed, open-access article on an IR theme
- Desirable: PhD in health systems/IR or medical degree plus 5 years in IR/health systems/programmatic work; experience with scoping/systematic reviews; interdisciplinary projects; ability to work independently
- · Other: Proof of study leave; willingness to meet host-country health requirements
- Equity: Applications encouraged regardless of gender identity, orientation, ethnicity, religion, background, or disability

International Conference on Family Planning (ICFP 2025)


1-6 November 2025, Bogotá, Colombia

Podcast Series: EYE on Yellow Fever

SUMMARY

The Eliminate Yellow Fever Epidemics (EYE) Strategy, launched in 2017, aims to end yellow fever epidemics by 2026. Despite the availability of a highly effective single-dose vaccine, yellow fever remains one of the most deadly diseases, with outbreaks resurging in Africa and beyond. To highlight these challenges and responses, WHO and partners have created the podcast series EYE on Yellow Fever.

About the series

- Produced by the EYE Partnership, which unites more than 50 global organisations, including WHO, UNICEF, Gavi, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. and the US CDC.
- Covers the latest scientific, public health, and community-level efforts across 40 high-risk countries.
- climate urbanisation. Explains how change. population movement, and post-COVID vaccination gaps drive yellow fever risk.

Selected episodes include:

- Yellow Fever in Africa: A Real-Time Emergency outbreak coordination from Burkina Faso.
- Monkeys and Yellow Fever the role of non-human primates in transmission in Argentina.
- Inside a Yellow Fever Laboratory diagnostics at Institut Pasteur Dakar.
- The Amazon, Climate Change, and Yellow Fever Risk - environmental pressures and public health.
- The Road to 2026 reflections from UNICEF, Gavi, and WHO on progress toward the elimination goal.
- Spotlight on Nigeria lessons from vaccinating nearly 100 million people.

The series demonstrates both the complexity and urgency of preventing yellow fever epidemics, while offering insights into science, preparedness, and success effective immunisation stories such as Ghana's campaigns.
