

## The Human Immunome Project's Ambitious Scientific Plan

The Human Immunome Project (HIP) announced a groundbreaking initiative to revolutionize our understanding of the immune system. By leveraging advanced **AI and comprehensive data collection**, HIP aims to **decode the human immune system**, improving global health outcomes. Key Points:

- **Understanding the Immune System:** The project aims to generate the world's largest and most diverse immunological dataset to enhance our understanding of immune responses.
- **Phased Data Collection:** Initially gathering data from 7-10 sites, expanding to over 100 locations globally, ensuring diverse demographic representation.
- Al Integration: Utilizing AI to create predictive and mechanistic models for personalized medical interventions and new therapies.
- **Diversity and Equity:** Focus on inclusive data collection considering age, ethnicity, geography, and socioeconomic status.
- **Global Collaboration:** Led by Dr. Hans Keirstead, the initiative involves collaboration with leading immunologists and global health experts.

#### New research flags the urgent need for research and evidence on the impact of climate change on neglected tropical diseases and malaria

On behalf of the WHO Task Team on Climate Change, Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs), and Malaria - partnered with Reaching the Last Mile (RLM) and led by Dr. Socé Fall, Director of WHO's NTDs Programme - we announce a **significant new scoping review**.

This extensive review, published in the **Transactions of The Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene**, analyzed **42,693 articles** and revealed substantial **gaps in our understanding of climate change's impact on NTDs and malaria**.

The findings highlight the **urgent need for further research** to address the **vulnerabilities** of **communities** most affected by these diseases. Rising temperatures and changing weather patterns are **altering the spread of vector-borne diseases**, like malaria and NTDs, placing additional strain on health systems and threatening to reverse decades of progress.

Dr. Socé Fall emphasizes the importance of **more comprehensive, collaborative, and standardized modeling** to better understand and predict these impacts. This research serves as a clarion call for scientists, particularly those in vulnerable communities, to focus on **mitigation and adaptation strategies that safeguard the fragile gains made against these diseases.** 

Tala Al-Ramahi, Chief Strategy Officer of RLM, underscores the necessity for **greater investment in research to develop timely and evidence-based interventions**, aiming to anticipate and mitigate the worst consequences of climate change on human health. The review shows that **only a small percentage of studies address mitigation and adaptation strategies**, underscoring the need for more focused efforts in these areas.

The WHO's Global Malaria Programme Director, Dr. Daniel Ngamije Madandi, highlights that the poorest populations, who are disproportionately affected by malaria and NTDs, are likely to bear the brunt of climate change's impacts. This calls for a more equitable, comprehensive, and sustainable response.


