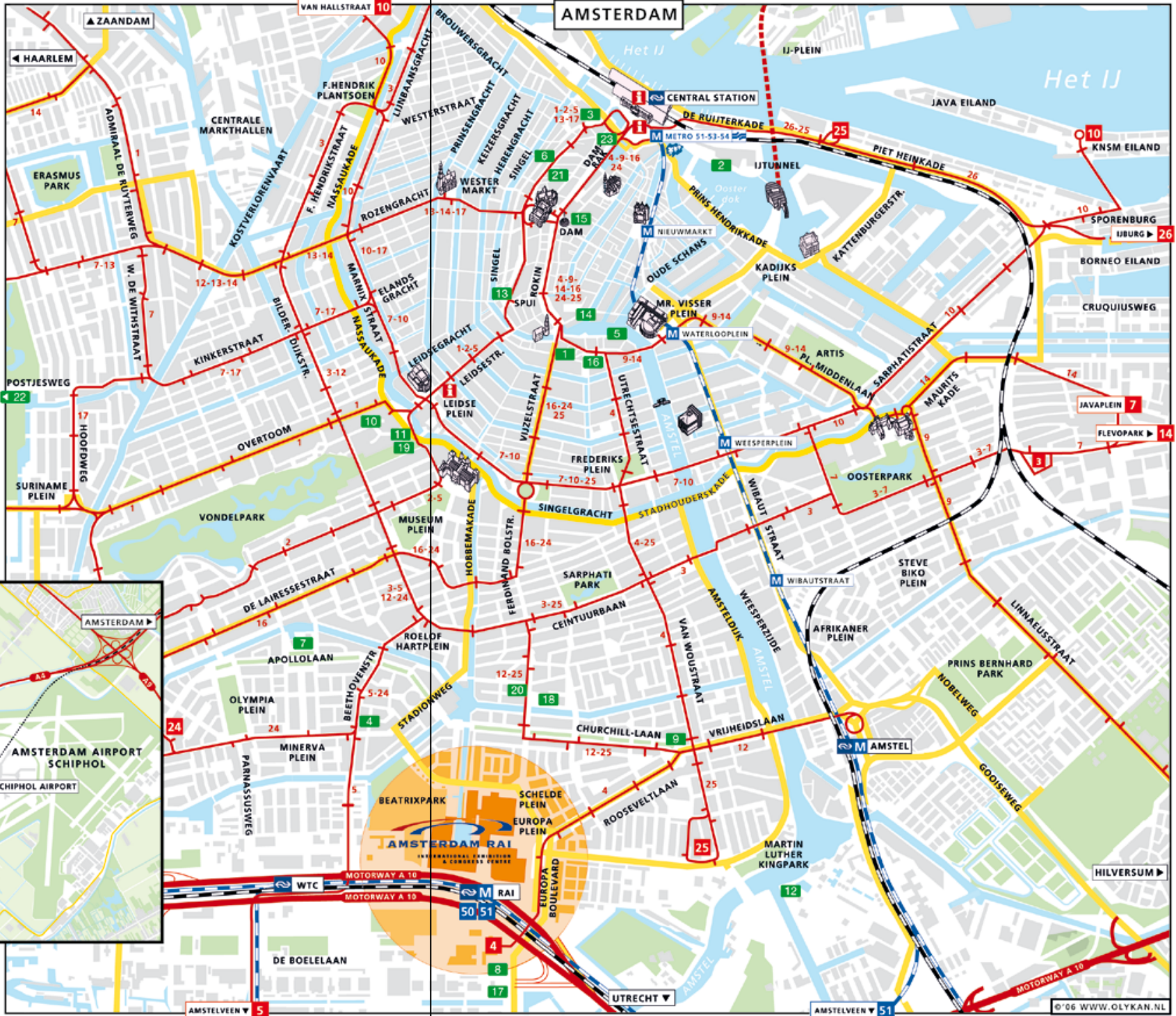

The Scientific Board of the 5th European Congress on Tropical Medicine and International Health welcomes the submission of abstracts for original contribution to the field. All abstracts accepted for presentation at the conference will be presented as poster or as oral presentation and will be published in the abstract book. These will be available on-site at the conference.

Abstract Submission

The deadline for abstract submission is March 15, 2007, midnight CET. No abstracts will be accepted after this date.

Please follow the steps listed on the website closely, in order to avoid mistakes. To help you with your abstract submission, the following guidelines have been drafted.

Guidelines

All abstracts must be submitted online through the conference website at www.trop-amsterdam2007.com

- Fields marked with a red star are mandatory.
- Abstracts must be prepared in English only.
- Abstracts sent by fax or post will not be accepted.
- The text should not exceed 300 words.

The text of the abstract should briefly state:

- Objectives (indicate the purpose of the study or the hypothesis that was tested)
- Methods (include the setting for the study, the subjects, the diagnosis or intervention and the type of statistical analysis; if references are needed, they should be given in the text)
- Results (present as clearly as possible the outcome of the study and statistical significance if appropriate)
- Conclusion (briefly discuss the data and emphasize the significance of the results)

A confirmation of receipt will be sent via e-mail upon submission of an abstract. All submitted abstracts will be reviewed by the Scientific Board. A confirmation of acceptance or rejection will be sent to the corresponding author by e-mail.
