HBV, HCV and HIV among inmates in Latin America and the Caribbean:

A systematic review and meta-analysis

A comprehensive **systematic review and meta-analysis**, published in *Tropical Medicine & International Health*, examines the prevalence of **Hepatitis B Virus (HBV)**, **Hepatitis C Virus (HCV)**, and **Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV)** among inmates in **Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC)**. This landmark study highlights the severe health challenges faced by incarcerated populations, offering critical insights for public health policy and interventions.

Key Findings

- **79 studies** analyzed data from over **230,000 inmates**, making this one of the most detailed studies of its kind.
- The study revealed that **HBV**, **HCV**, and **HIV** are widespread among inmates in LAC, reflecting significant public health concerns.
- **Risk factors** for infection included:
 - **Previous incarceration**, which increases exposure to unsafe conditions.
 - Unsafe sexual practices and lack of access to condoms.
 - **Drug use**, particularly through shared needles.
 - Extended prison stays, increasing exposure to transmission risks.

Regional Challenges

- Prisons in **LAC are characterized by overcrowding**, inadequate healthcare, and high-risk behaviors, creating an environment where infections spread rapidly.
- **Brazil**, which accounts for over **60% of the studies**, reported some of the highest infection rates, underscoring the urgency for interventions in countries with large incarcerated populations.
- Women inmates, although a smaller proportion of the population, also face high rates of HIV and other infections, necessitating gender-specific health policies.

Health Implications

The study underscores the need for urgent interventions to address health inequities in correctional facilities:

- 1. **Routine Testing**: Regular screening for HBV, HCV, and HIV is vital to early detection and containment.
- 2. **Treatment Access**: Providing antiviral therapies for those infected can prevent complications and reduce transmission.
- 3. Prevention Programs:
 - HBV vaccination to reduce new cases.
 - Distribution of **condoms** and **harm reduction tools**, such as clean needles.
- 4. Education and Counseling: Empower inmates with knowledge about prevention and self-care.

Call to Action

This review is a **call for public health integration in prison systems**, urging policymakers and health professionals to:

- Prioritize healthcare in prisons as part of national public health strategies.
- Address systemic barriers, such as funding gaps and stigma, that hinder effective healthcare delivery.
- Recognize the role of **prison health in broader community health**, as many inmates return to their communities post-incarceration.

Why It Matters

The findings reflect broader global health disparities:

- Incarcerated populations are disproportionately affected by infectious diseases, often due to social and structural neglect.
- Interventions in prisons can have **far-reaching impacts** on public health, reducing community transmission and improving health outcomes for vulnerable populations.

<u>Global Health in 2024</u>



A Year of Progress, Challenges, and Transformations

The World Health Organization (WHO) marked 2024 as a pivotal year in global health. From significant strides in disease elimination to tackling the increasing burden of noncommunicable diseases (NCDs), the year encapsulated both breakthroughs and persistent challenges. As the global community looks forward to a healthier and more equitable future, the milestones of 2024 offer a foundation for continued action.

1. Disease Elimination: A Global Victory

Eliminating diseases not only improves health outcomes but also enhances socioeconomic conditions. In 2024, several nations achieved remarkable milestones in this endeavor:

- **Seven Countries**: Brazil, Chad, India, Jordan, Pakistan, Timor-Leste, and Viet Nam eliminated neglected tropical diseases (NTDs) such as trachoma, lymphatic filariasis, and human African trypanosomiasis.
- Malaria Eradication: Egypt was declared malaria-free, while Cabo Verde joined the ranks of malaria-free nations.
- **Maternal and Neonatal Health**: Guinea eradicated maternal and neonatal tetanus, and Belize, Jamaica, and Saint Vincent and the Grenadines eliminated mother-to-child transmission of HIV and syphilis.
- **Immunization Efforts**: The Americas were reverified as measles-free, and new vaccines for malaria, meningitis, and HPV were introduced in 17 countries, underscoring the importance of immunization programs.

These achievements highlight the critical role of sustained partnerships, robust health systems, and targeted public health interventions.

2. The Growing Burden of Noncommunicable Diseases

NCDs, including heart disease, diabetes, cancer, and respiratory conditions, remain the leading cause of death globally. Key developments in 2024 include:

- **Tobacco Use Reduction**: The WHO Global Report on Trends in Tobacco Use 2000–2030 revealed a decline in global tobacco users, from 1 in 3 in 2000 to 1 in 5 in 2022. However, alarming rates of tobacco use among adolescents signal the need for stronger policies.
- **Physical Inactivity**: Nearly 1.8 billion adults face health risks due to insufficient physical activity, demanding innovative and inclusive approaches to promote healthier lifestyles.
- **Diabetes and Obesity**: A sharp rise in obesity has pushed the global diabetic population to over 800 million, reflecting the urgency of addressing diet and lifestyle factors.
- **Substance Use**: Alcohol and drug-related deaths remain a pressing issue, with 3.2 million fatalities annually. WHO called for improved prevention, treatment, and policy frameworks.

The Fourth High-level UN Meeting on NCDs, scheduled for 2025, aims to accelerate the global response to these challenges and align health systems with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

3. Climate and Health: The Fight Against Antimicrobial Resistance and

Climate Change

Antimicrobial resistance (AMR) and climate change emerged as central themes in 2024:

- **AMR**: A global declaration sought to reduce deaths from drug-resistant bacteria by 10% by 2030, emphasizing the need for innovation and equitable access to antibiotics.
- **Climate Resilience**: A WHO resolution highlighted the profound health risks posed by climate change, urging countries to integrate health considerations into climate policies.

These initiatives reflect a growing recognition of the interconnectedness of environmental, human, and animal health under the One Health framework.

4. Strengthening Global Health Security

Global health security advanced through two major frameworks:

- 1. International Health Regulations (IHR) Amendments: New definitions and mechanisms aim to improve pandemic preparedness and international collaboration.
- 2. **Proposed Pandemic Agreement**: Member States extended negotiations on this critical instrument to address future pandemics effectively.

In addition, WHO responded to multiple emergencies, from the ongoing mpox outbreak to crises in Gaza and Sudan, showcasing the need for robust emergency response mechanisms.

5. Addressing Misinformation: A New Frontier

In an era of rampant misinformation, WHO intensified efforts to combat health-related falsehoods. Public trust in science and evidence-based policies is essential for health interventions to succeed. WHO called for coordinated action from governments, health agencies, and the private sector to counteract the damaging effects of fake news.

6. Universal Health Coverage and Equity

WHO's **Transformation Agenda**, aligned with the Fourteenth General Programme of Work (GPW14), focused on empowering country offices and strengthening health systems. Key actions included:

- Enhancing operational efficiency and partnerships.
- Supporting Member States in achieving universal health coverage (UHC).
- Addressing health inequities, especially in low- and middle-income countries.

7. Celebrating 50 Years of Expanded Immunization

Since its launch in 1974, the Expanded Programme on Immunization (EPI) has saved an estimated 154 million lives. In 2024, 84% of infants globally received essential vaccines, highlighting immunization as the most impactful health intervention.

World Malaria Report 2024: Addressing the Global Burden of Malaria



The **World Malaria Report 2024**, published by the WHO, emphasizes the urgent need for reinvigorated global efforts to tackle the rising burden of malaria. In 2023, an estimated **263 million cases** of malaria occurred globally, reflecting an increase of 11 million cases from the previous year. The incidence rate rose to 60.4 cases per 1,000 at-risk population, with the **WHO African Region** bearing the brunt of the disease burden, accounting for 94% of global cases. Key contributors include Nigeria, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Uganda, Ethiopia, and Mozambique.

Key Highlights:

- **Top Five Burden Countries**: Nigeria (26% of global cases), followed by the Democratic Republic of the Congo (13%), Uganda (5%), Ethiopia (4%), and Mozambique (4%).
- **Deaths**: Malaria caused 597,000 deaths globally in 2023, showing a steady decrease from previous years, although challenges persist in meeting reduction milestones.
- **Progress and Challenges**: The WHO's "Global Technical Strategy for Malaria 2016–2030" sets ambitious targets for reduction in cases and mortality, yet many regions remain off track due to barriers like inequity, conflict, and climate variability.

The report underscores the need for tailored interventions, enhanced funding, and equitable access to prevention, treatment, and care. For detailed insights and data trends, refer to the full report.

The VALIDATE Network has officially launched the Round 5 VALIDATE Fellowships, a program aimed at advancing vaccine development for neglected intracellular pathogens like *Mycobacteria*, *Leishmania*, and *Burkholderia pseudomallei*. These pathogens are responsible for significant global morbidity and mortality, particularly in LMICs.

Key Details

- Objective: Support two years of independent research for LMIC-based associate members to:
 - Produce pilot data.
 - Build experience for future funding opportunities.
 - Lay the foundation for leadership roles in research.
- Eligibility:
 - Applicants must be VALIDATE associate members based at LMIC institutes.
 - Individuals who have not previously received a VALIDATE Fellowship.

Research Focus

Projects should align with VALIDATE's mission to accelerate vaccine development. This includes research across biological, physical, social sciences, and humanities, emphasizing scientific excellence and innovation.
