The Genuine Account of the Life and Trial of Eugene Aram was first published by W. Bristow in 1759. Eugene Aram killed his close friend Daniel Clark in 1744. Having hidden the body, he escaped justice until a skeleton was dug up in St Peter's Church Yard in Knaresborough in 1758. Aram was arrested, whereupon he confessed, conducted his own defence, was found guilty. He unsuccessfully attempted suicide the night before his execution. The whole saga of disappearance, murder and trial was a huge sensation popularised by the many works issued, especially Thomas Hood's ballad "The Dream of Eugene Aram" published in 1831. Norrisson Scatcherd was an antiquary and barrister, elected a fellow of the Society of Antiquaries in 1853.

Jane Austen's first draft of this most famous of all English novels was titled *First Impressions* and was written between October 1796 and August 1797 when she was only twenty-one years old. Her father, John Austen, wrote to the publisher Cadell to gauge his interest, but to no avail. Jane Austen re-wrote her text during 1809-1810 in her first year at Chawton, and in 1812 she referred to her "lopping & cropping" the text prior to final publication. The copyright was sold to T. Egerton for £110 and it was finally published in January 1813, Jane Austen writing on receipt of her own copy on 29 January, "I have got my own darling child from London".

Sense and Sensibility was first published in October or November 1811 but had been many years in the making. The earliest drafts date to around 1795 in the form of letters, and the story in book form was begun in November 1797, with revisions taking place between 1809-1810 at Chawton. Every copy of the initial print run had been sold by 3 July 1813. Jane Austen introduced several textual alterations into this second edition and one passage with "reference to an improper subject" was omitted.

AN EXCEPTIONALLY RARE COPY IN THE ORIGINAL BOARDS IN SUCH GOOD CONDITION OF POSSIBLY THE AUTHOR'S FINEST NOVEL. Jane Austen had arranged publication of her first two works through T. Egerton but John Murray had issued *Mansfield Park* and whilst keen to publish *Emma*, offered so little that she more or less paid for publication herself. 2000 copies were printed, of which the majority were sold within the first year.

A previous owner has annotated this copy "The first edition | Pickering | clean copy in original boards". Ferdinand Pickering was the first to illustrate Jane Austen, his engraved designs appeared in Bentley's Standard Novels edition of Jane Austen published in 1833.

The first edition of *Mansfield Park* was published in May 1814 and by November of the same year all copies had been sold. T. Egerton was not enthusiastic about a second edition and so Jane Austen entrusted John Murray with its publication. Northanger Abbey was probably the first novel written by Jane Austen, initially in a version with the title Susan and Persuasion was the last she wrote. Both were finally published posthumously with a Biographical Preface by her brother, Henry Austen, the first time she was publicly acknowledged as the author of her four previous works.

A FINE COPY OF THE RARE FIRST COMPLETE EDITION OF FRANCIS BACON'S THIRTY-EIGHT ESSAYS. Francis Bacon's Essaies were first published in 1597 by Humfrey Hooper, but the third edition of 1598 was the first to contain the Meditations in English. John Jaggard published an edition in 1606 and this, as with the earlier editions, only contained 10 essays. Jaggard had prepared for publication in 1612 a re-issue of his 1606 edition of the 10 essays, however on 12 October 1612 William Hall and John Beale issued an edition with the addition of 28 new essays. Jaggard therefore cancelled his final leaves G7-8 and, having obtained the text of the new essays, added these as signatures H-O. It would appear his edition was prepared prior to the Beale edition for it retained the original dedication to Anthony Bacon who had died, Beale's edition containing a dedication to Sir John Constable. Jaggard's widow transferred "her estate" in this edition on 24 February 1626, indicating Jaggard would have acquired rights to the later essays, rather than simply pirating the Beale edition, even though not registered with the Stationers' Company.

ESTC records five copies in the UK with 6 copies in the US, a few of which retain leaves G7-8. The Huth copy appears to be the only other copy recorded at auction but does not contain leaves G7-8

The first edition of this text was printed in Prague in 1670 but it was the fine engravings by Johann Andreas Pfeffel of this 1725 edition that drew attention to the work, reissued in 1729 after the Canonisation of John of Nepomuk (1350-1393). Bohuslav Balbin (1621-1688) was a Czech writer and Jesuit who devoted his entire life to collecting and editing material on the geography, history and natural history of Bohemia and was a prominent advocate of the native Czech language.

A fine and complete English book of hours; the three works were issued together but are listed separately in STC. At this time (between 1526 and 1538) François Regnault was the primary producer of English liturgical works, possibly through an arrangement with (or successful competition against) Wynkyn de Worde who ceased producing them in the late 1520s. However, an Act passed in 1536 restricted the activities of foreigners in the English book trade and Regnault's dominance of this market came to an end shortly after. Regnault's octavo editions of the Sarum primer contained more material in English than previous editions.

This is a later state of STC 16008.3, with quire B replaced, thereby removing the calendar entry for St Thomas a Becket, and leaf H1 and the index in the *Pystles and Gospels* has the text relating to Thomas crossed through.

There is an early manuscript addition to the calendar, "the xxiiith day of may father Thomas Carye Goddere [?]".

John Bradford was an English reformer, Chaplain to Edward VI and Prebendary of St Paul's, who was imprisoned in the Tower of London and burnt at the stake on 1 July 1555 under the orders of Mary I. *Godlie Meditations* was written while he was in the Tower and excerpts were published in 1559.

William Stuart, eldest son of William Stuart, Archbishop of Armagh, the fourth son of the Earl of Bute, amassed a large library of books part of which was sold at Sotheby's on 17 June 1875, and some at Christie's on 6 March 1895. The remaining collection was destroyed in a fire at Tempsford Hall soon after the Christie's sale. William Stuart had bought many books from the library of Lord Stuart de Rothesay and often added his arms to his these books. The Royal Library at Windsor contains many books from both the de Rothesay and Stuart libraries.

- ...I returned to my book Bewick's History of British Birds: the letterpress thereof I cared little for, generally speaking; and yet there were certain introductory pages that, child as I was, I could not pass quite as a blank...
- ...The words in these introductory pages connected themselves with the succeeding vignettes, and gave significance to the rock standing up alone in a sea of billow and spray; to the broken boat stranded on a desolate coast; to the cold and ghastly moon glancing through bars of cloud at a wreck just sinking.

I cannot tell what sentiment haunted the quite solitary churchyard, with its inscribed headstone; its gate, its two trees, its low horizon, girdled by a broken wall, and its newlyrisen crescent, attesting the hour of eventide.

The two ships becalmed on a torpid sea, I believed to be marine phantoms.

The fiend pinning down the thief's pack behind him, I passed over quickly: it was an object of terror.

So was the black horned thing seated aloof on a rock, surveying a distant crowd surrounding a gallows.

Each picture told a story; mysterious often to my undeveloped understanding and imperfect feelings, yet ever profoundly interesting...

The engravings by Thomas Bewick were an important early influence on the Brontës. Patrick Brontë has noted – on the title-page of the second volume – that the books are "valuable" as the engravings were "done by Bewick's own hands" and the illustrations were a rich resource for the Brontë children. Certainly, Christine Alexander and Jane Sellars in *The Art of the Brontës* (Cambridge, 1995) note that the two volumes of Bewick's 1816 edition "...provided the first copybook for all four of the Brontë children. From 1828 until 1833, Charlotte, Branwell, Emily and Anne made six copies of Bewick's miniature wood engravings from volume 1... and again the four Brontës made five more copies from volume 2... the opening pages of *Jane Eyre* are surely the finest tribute ever made to Bewick's ability to seize the imagination".

Many of Bewick's vignettes are unrelated to the ornithological text. Alexander and Sellars describe them as "usually matter-of-fact comments on everyday life. They tell their own story..." One, of a farmer's wife attacked by a goose, (Volume 2, page 253) was copied by Emily (see item 307 in *The Art of*

the Brontës) and, as noted by Alexander and Sellars, "...the realistic, often grim, sense of humour evident in Bewick's tail-pieces would have appealed to the creator of the initial scenes of Wuthering Heights..." Emily drew the farmer's wife on 25 April 1829 and then, on 22 May 1829, she turned her attention to the other volume of Bewick and drew 'The Ring Ouzel' (item 308 in The Art of the Brontës and see Volume 1, page 122).

The first volume includes a rough pencil drawing on the front free endpaper, of a woman apparently washing the back of her neck.

Throughout the two volumes, Patrick Brontë provides a series of ornithological notes, personal observations and statements on eating different types of birds. Perhaps when Jane Eyre retreats to the window-seat in the breakfast-rooms she wants to enter a terrible imaginary world, but she may also be a little peckish?

Patrick Brontë is at pains to note the appearance of dead birds. Both volumes include a note "According to Audubon, the colours of most birds fade, after they have been for some time dead" and the first volume includes a separate note "As I have read and seen, the beauty of the colours of birds greatly fades after they be dead". Some of the notes are ascribed to "Bingley", "Bentley" or, simply "B". Other notes invite the reader to refer to alternative sources ("vide Bingley") (presumably Thomas Bingley, *Tales about Birds, illustrative of their Nature, Habits and Instincts*, first published in 1839).

Brontë's ornithological notes include:

An eagle's conflict with a cat is retold within the printed text (and attributed to Mr Barlow). Brontë gives further details which he attributes to "Bentley" and then concludes with "Eagles, however, as I have read, often destroy cats, and devour them. – B."

- "...the rapidity with which the hawk, and many other birds, occasionally fly is probably not less than at the rate of 150 miles in an hour..."
- "...larks sometimes escape from the pursuit of the hawk, though they are more frequently taken. But, the hawk is seldom, or never able to catch any of the swallow genus on account of their extraordinary ability..."
- "...according to the newspaper accounts, several courier pigeons brought to London from Liege were let loose and in six successive hours, flew to their home a distance of three hundred miles thus going at the rate of 50 miles an hour! The swiftest horses cannot travel at the rate of above 15 or 20 miles an hour and that only for an hour or two as I have proved..."
- "I was informed... Gulls, which were overtaken at sea in a heavy storm, have been found dead, in hundreds, on the sea shore..."
- "According to the newspapers, a Wild Swan was shot... which measured from tip to tip of the wings, eight feet; and weighed twenty four pounds"
- "In 1840, I bought for 3s a Bean Goose, which was shot, and wounded, but not kill'd... I kept it... till it seem'd to be domesticated, but one morning, when driven out with some tame geese, it suddenly flew off... ...ascended high in the air, and probably flew to the Orkneys or to Greenland, as it took a Northerly direction..."

Personal observations include:

"I saw, in Leeds, a stuffed specimen of this bird; it was considerably larger than a goose, as its neck was a thick as a man's arm" [on The Golden Eagle]

- "This bird has peculiarly great strength and vigour in pulling out the feathers of its tail, which I was obliged to do, with pincers, it struck its talons through a thick pair of gloves, which I wore, and brought the blood profusely out of my hands 1841 It drove its talons in with often repeated and quick, successive efforts' [on The Merlin]
- "I have repeatedly seen rooks attack, and drive away, the heron, hawk and raven from their nests after furious combats" [on Rooks]
- "I saw a pair of Ring Ouzels in Haworth Mountains"

[Missel Thrush] "...is the large bird that sings"

- "I once heard a nightingale sing in a wood near Cambridge"
- "As I have often seen; White-Rumps in the north of England, particularly begin to build their nests in the third or fourth week of May and their young fly in the first weeks of July"

Culinary notes (occasionally blended with religious law) include:

- "coarse and unpalatable" [on The Starling]
- "Ut legi, blackbirds are considered good eating"
- "This is very delicate eating..." [on The Throstle]
- "All kinds of pigeons (ut legi) are good eating..."
- "This bird (ut legi) is good eating" [on The Turtle Dove]
- "The use of peacocks for food is not forbidden in the Law of Moses"
- "This (ut legi, in Johnson's works &c.) is excellent eating" [on The Black Grouse]
- "Grouse when very high, or long kept, become considerably bitter but if eaten soon after they are killed, the bitter taste is scarcely perceptible... In the latter part of the season, when there are but few insects, the heath renders Grouse more bitter to the taste, and to some palates, less agreeable..."
- "The bustard is excellent food..."
- "As appears from Dr A. Clerk, and various other commentators, the Lapwing is not forbidden in the Law of Moses"
- "...it had a fine flavour" [on The Golden Plover]
- "I have eaten of this bird, and found it to be greatly superior for its flavour, either to the pheasant, the partridge, or moorhen" [on The Woodcock]
- "All the Red and Greenshank are good eating..."
- "Ut legi, all the Grebes are fishy tasted, and very bad eating and so are *all* birds, that live on fish..."
- "Audubon says that the flesh of the Eider Duck, though sometimes of a fishy taste, is generally good eating"
- "In 1826, I purchased... three Scoters and got two of them cooked they tasted, and smelt, very much like a mixture of beef, and red herrings they cost 15d each"
- "I once had presented to me the female of the above species... and found it to be excellent food" [on The Tufted Duck]

Above all, one gets a sense of a well-loved annotated copy that is both entertaining and informative. There are also occasional notes that an imaginative reader would especially cherish. Brontë notes of the Shrike, for example, that they sometimes "represent those imaginary ghosts, that often excite the fears of weak and superstitious people who are deceived by the uncertainty of darkness..."

This third edition published April 15 1848 is regarded as identical to the second edition published January 22 1848 and is probably issued from the second edition sheets but with a different title-page and a new preface dated April 13 in which Charlotte Bronte states any other works of fiction issued in the name of Currer Bell were done so fraudulently and were not of her authorship. It was not until the summer of 1848 that Charlotte Bronte and her sisters admitted their true authorship to their publisher George Smith.

Emily and Anne "as unknown authors, paid Newby fifty pounds to publish Wuthering Heights and Agnes Grey. He nevertheless delayed publication. Later he attempted to capitalize on the success of Jane Eyre by finally publishing the novels and falsely claiming that all three works were by the same author." Charlotte Brontë quickly realised what Newby was intending, for her work should have appeared after her sisters' and she did her best to extricate them from the deal with Newby. However, Emily and Anne allowed him to go ahead but on publication on December 4 1847, all were disappointed for, "The books are not well got up - they abound in errors of the press." It is claimed that between 250 and 350 copies were finally published by Newby. Similar to Smith binding variant B ("dark grayish reddish brown") as described from a photograph by Parrish of his copy, but in maroon, ribbed grain leading from top left to bottom right.

Copies bound in cloth-backed boards "were intended for the circulating libraries. Such copies, though quite rare, are more commonly found than copies bound in cloth."

There appear to be only three other copies recorded in the original cloth: a copy also inscribed by Patrick Bronte but to Martha and Eliza Brown, sold Sotheby's 20 November 1899, lot 134 to Maggs, but with this note, "title and back cover tampered with, sold not subject to return"; the Parrish copy, and the Shorter copy lacking the title-pages and volume 1 pp.163-168, bought from Reverend A.B. Nicholls, sold at auction Christies New York, December 4 2009, lot 27. The Sadleir and Wise copies were both in original cloth-backed boards. Smith states that "The final two leaves of advertisements in volume three are missing in most copies".

Smith writes "When I first undertook this compilation I did not yet fully appreciate the scarcity of copies in original bindings ... English first editions of *Wuthering Heights* ... are seldom seen in their original bindings." The first edition is exceedingly rare in that it was published under an obscure imprint - Thomas Cautley Newby.

Martha Brown was born in Haworth in 1828, one of six daughters of John Brown, the village sexton and great friend of the Reverend Patrick Brontë. At some point all the girls worked at the Parsonage but Martha was the only one to live in and remained with the family from the age of 13 until the death of Patrick Brontë in 1861. She then moved with Charlotte Brontë's widower, the Reverend Nicholls to Ireland but soon returned to Haworth. At her death in 1880 her large collection of Brontë memorabilia was dispersed, much of it being acquired by the Brontë Museum in Haworth. Patrick Brontë gave Martha copies of Wuthering Heights, Villette, Shirley and The Tenant of Wildfell Hall and in his will she was left a quite considerable sum of money in recognition of her long service. William Law appears to have met Martha Brown, and it may be that he acquired this book directly from her, as he did a letter from Charlotte Brontë.

RARE WORKS WITH A NOTABLE HAWORTH PROVENANCE. The literary compositions of the Rev. Patrick Brontë provide an insight into his children's work, not least when he described (in the third person) the joy of writing: "When released from his clerical avocations, he was occupied in writing the Cottage Poems; from morning till noon, and from noon till night, his employment was full of real, indescribable pleasure, such as he could wish to taste as long as life lasts." (preface to Cottage Poems)

In his 1818 preface to *The Cottage in the Wood*, his most successful publication, Brontë attacked novelists and their readers as "beings of depraved appetites and sickly imaginations, who [...] are diligently and zealously employed in creating an imaginary world, which they can never inhabit, only to make the real world, with which they must necessarily be conversant, gloomy and insupportable." It seems likely that when he came to reread this puritanical blast in 1850 he was not unaware of the irony and attempted to mitigate his apparent attack on his daughters' works by adding a note reassuring the reader that not all novelists were such moral degenerates.

These copies belonged to members of the Brown family, who for generations were sextons of Haworth and were very well known to the Brontës. Martha Brown was a long-term servant of the Brontë family. Her younger sister Eliza worked at the parsonage in 1855, when she witnessed Patrick's will, and again in 1861.

Thomas Crofton Croker travelled throughout Ireland collecting legends and folklore from around 1812. He sent several ancient Irish songs and poems to Thomas Moore in 1818 who used these in his *Irish Melodies*. Croker published his own anthology between 1825-1828, but having lost much of his collected material and manuscript notes, he had to invoke the help of friends to reconstruct his labours. Volume 1 was published to great acclaim in 1825 and praised by the Grimm Brothers who translated it into German and by Walter Scott. It was Croker's work which first drew wider attention to and acclaim for traditional Irish folklore and literature. Volume 3 included Croker's translation of the Grimm Brothers' long essay on Elves.

Cruikshank was approached by several publishers including John Major, John Murray and Thomas Roscoe in 1830 to prepare a new set of illustrations for the tale to comprise woodcuts of a better quality than those found in the cheap chapbooks in general circulation. After competitive discussions Major obtained the right to publish first with Roscoe following shortly after. Major wished to produce an edition comparable with the fine 1790 Thomas Stothard engraved edition and hence restored the full text and added Cruikshank's new woodcut illustrations.

Nathaniel Dancer was a bookseller in Fleet Street, by St Dunstan's Church. He sold Bibles, Prayer Books, School Books, also suites of wood-engravings with or without the books. The 'Preface to the Reader' signed 'N.D.', states the book was "written to Improve the Understanding of the Younger Sort of all Degrees, and sharpen their Conceits with such Curious Fancies, and Real Matters, that may be Practical and Advantageous to them on many Occasions, by readily resorting to (in a small Compass) the Wits of the Antient and Modern Ages of the World".

RARE: the only recorded institutional copy is in Oxford and we have no record of another copy having appeared at auction in recent decades.

The first issue with the "Fireside" plate. Richard Bentley decided to publish *Oliver Twist* in book form before its completion as a periodical. Cruikshank had to rush the last few plates only allowing Dickens to see these on the eve of publication. Dickens did not approve of the last plate in volume 3, "Rose Maylie and Oliver" known as the "Fireside" plate. He had Cruickshank redraw the plate placing Rose and Oliver in Church, known as the "Church" plate, and this was inserted in later issues.

The Moorland Cottage was Elizabeth Gaskell's second published novel, Mary Barton having appeared in 1848 to great acclaim, provoking widespread discussion of the plight of the impoverished workers in the North of England. Oliver Goldsmith arrived in London from Ireland in 1756, penniless, and soon turned to journalism to earn a living. Struggling, he was eventually taken into the circle of Samuel Johnson becoming one of the original nine members of The Circle, a literary dining club founded by Johnson and Joshua Reynolds. His reputation was cemented with publication of *The Traveller* in 1764. Johnson took the manuscript of *The Vicar of Wakefield*, written between 1761-62, and sold it to Francis Newbery who finally published it to great acclaim in 1766. One of the most popular and widely read eighteenth century novels among Victorians, it is frequently mentioned in nineteenth century works such as *Middlemarch* and *Emma*.

RARE WITH THE HALF-TITLE. "This play was evidently altered as it went through the press, the different states of different sheets being bound up in various combinations" (Rothschild). This copy accords with the third issue recorded by Rothschild as being in the British Museum and described by I.A Williams, with the half-title, no price on title-page, double rule in correct alignment, Epilogue as a separate leaf at the end, Diggory included in the 'Dramatis Personae'.

Goldsmith struggled all his life with debts and *She Stoops to Conquer*, like most of his works, was published to settle these. Issued to great acclaim it was first performed in London at the Covent Garden Theatre in March 1773, Goldsmith dying the following year. Initially titled *Mistakes of a Night*, the play was a laughing comedy, a satire on the excesses of the time, much based on Goldsmith's own escapades and experiences.

Samuel Goodrich (1793-1860) was an American publisher and writer who issued many books for children including Tales of Peter Parley about America in 1827 which proved so popular he wrote a series of similar works for children under the pen name 'Peter Parley' with the first Annual appearing in 1840. His aim was to educate but amuse children, a revolutionary concept in his time. The 'Peter Parley' books were hugely popular in England with publishers and other authors issuing their own works under his pen-name with no acknowledgement of or to Goodrich. John Darton published many of Goodrich's works in England and shipped them back to America. William Martin edited many of the later spurious titles in the 1850s and 1860s, and George Mogridge wrote many of the titles issued by William Tegg, but it was Samuel Clark alone who received praise from Goodrich for his Peter Parley's wonders of the earth, sea and sky published by Darton in 1837.

EXTREMELY RARE, ESPECIALLY IN ORIGINAL BOARDS. James Grahame (1765-1911) was a Scottish poet, lawyer and curate. Author of several works including *The Sabbath*, 1804, his most well-known work, and *Poems on the Abolition of the Slave Trade* with Elizabeth Benger and James Montgomery, 1809. *Poems in English, Scotch and Latin* was Grahame's first published work, only issued in this one edition, and was heavily suppressed by Grahame. It contains 'On Burns the Scottish Poet', a Latin translation of Burns' 'To a Mouse' and the sarcastic 'An unanswerable argument for the slave trade'.

A contemporary inscription in another copy of the work states 'These poems are the works of my most kind and dear early friend James Grahame, author of The Sabbath. I never saw another copy, and doubt if there are half-a-dozen in existence. [signed] J. Richardson [?]. He bought them all [?] and destroyed them.'

EXTREMELY RARE AND MOST LIKELY THE SECOND QUARTO EDITION. John Gray let his friend Horace Walpole have the manuscript of his poem but Walpole had accidentally allowed this to come into the hands of William Own who issued it without authorisation in Number VIII of his *The Magazine* of Magazines on 16 February, titled 'Stanza's Written in a Country Church-Yard'. Gray wrote on 12 February "I have but one bad Way left to escape the Honour they would inflict upon me & therefore am obliged to desire you would make Dodsley print it immediately (w^{ch} may be done in less than a Week's time) from your Copy but without my Name, in what Form is most convenient for him, but in his best Paper & Character, he must correct the Press himself, & print it without any Interval between the Stanzas ... & the Title must be, Elegy, wrote in a Country Church-yard."

Rothschild lists the 1751 Dodsley version published on 15 February, the Owen version published on 16 February, a 'Third Edition corrected' also 1751 which he claims was the first such to contain the four line stanza beginning 'There scatter'd oft ...' before *The Epitaph*. This stanza was removed from subsequent editions.

This copy contains the corrected 'secret Bow'r' for 'sacred Bow'r'. On 3 March 1751 Gray wrote to Walpole that this was one of the *Errata* which was corrected in three editions, the second quarto, the second impression of the fourth quarto and the eighth quarto. This edition has pencilled in below the line 'Awake and faithful to her wonted Fires' on p. 11, 'Ev'n in our Ashes live their wonted Fires'. This was corrected in the eighth and subsequent editions. This edition has corrections 'rouse', p.6 l.8, 'kindred' p.10 l.4, 'smiling' p.10 l.13.

A FINE COPY OF THIS EXTREMELY RARE NOVEL. Elizabeth Inchbald, nee Simpson, was born in 1753 and was initially known as a hard-working actress. After her husband's death in 1779 she concentrated on writing for the stage and her first work was a farce A Mogul Tale, staged at the Haymarket Theatre in 1784 on the highly topical subject of ballooning - the first demonstration of hot-air ballooning having been in 1783. Between 1784 and 1805 she wrote twenty-one plays. Her first novel. A Simple Story, was published by William Godwin in 1791 and was much admired by Maria Edgeworth amongst others. Its main theme was that a proper education for women was essential. Nature and Art was her second novel and explores the themes of upbringing in 'natural' versus 'educated' environments. In 1806 she was asked by the publishers Longmans to write critical and biographical introductions to a series of 125 plays from the sixteenth to eighteenth centuries - a highly unusual request at that time of a woman - but one that reflected her experience and standing as actress and playwright.

This collection of thirty-four essays and short stories were published serially in the US by C.S. Van Winkle between 1819 and 1820 and include two of his best known stories, 'The Legend of Sleepy Hollow' and 'Rip Van Winkle'. In order to secure the British copyright, Irving had self-published one volume of essays under the imprint of John Miller in February 1820. It was Walter Scott who recommended Irving to John Murray who continued publication with a second volume in July 1820. Critical and popular acclaim was forthcoming and did much to promote American literature as being "elegant and refined" (William Godwin).

PRESENTATION COPIES SIGNED BY WASHINGTON IRVING ARE RARE, ESPECIALLY FROM THIS EARLY DATE. This copy was inscribed and presented to the wife of the Irish poet Thomas Moore, with whom Irving spent much time in Paris and London around 1823-1824.

RARE. Matthew Lewis' important Gothic novel marked a turning point in Gothic literature, away from the rather gentle and sentimental early works towards more horrific and shocking themes reflecting erotic obsession and the corruption of power. Whilst attracting critical rebuke from scholars and notably the Church, it was a hugely popular work with the general reader and was appeared in many editions. The first edition was issued anonymously, but encouraged by its success, Lewis added his name and rank as Member of Parliament to the title-page of the second edition published in October 1796. However, as the criticism developed by the fourth edition Lewis expunged much of the more shocking elements of his tale, in particular references to erotic obsession and lust.

The engraved portrait frontispiece was prepared for publication in *The Monthly Mirror* published by T. Bellamy with imprint dated Nov. 13 1796. The November issue of the periodical states however 'The *Engraving* intended for this number is unavoidably postponed until our next, when it will most certainly appear, together with the PORTRAIT of an eminent literary character.' However the portrait which appeared in the December issue was by Ridley of Disraeli not Lewis. There appear to be no copies recorded with this portrait.

The process of publication of *The Life and Opinions of Tristram Shandy* was complicated at the start, for Sterne initially offered the first two volumes to R. Dodsley for £50, but to be printed in York, however he was turned down for "it was too much to risk on a single volume". Sterne having shown a circle of contemporaries his manuscript and, listening to their comments, had revised and extended his first two volumes which Dodsley then agreed to print. These sold exceedingly well, "There are two Volumes just published here, which have made a great noise and have had a prodigious run; for, in two days after they came out, the Bookseller sold two hundred, and continues

selling them very fast." Its popular and critical success was assured when David Garrick praised it and passed it on to his friends. Sterne drove a hard bargain with his publishers over remuneration for the subsequent volumes, promised on an annual basis, to the astonishment of his contemporaries. Becoming highly sought after by Society, finally acquiring a position in the Church and hence an assured living, Sterne's life was irrevocably altered by the book's success.

The frontispiece here inserted later as a cancel into volume one was engraved designed by William Hogarth at Sterne's request for the second edition published by Dodsley later the same year, 1860.

Regarded today as perhaps the first playfully experimental novel in the English language *Tristram Shandy* is a humorous and philosophical investigation into the connection between literature and life. Sterne was instrumental in the rise of the novel in the eighteenth century and his influence on his contemporaries such as Daniel Defoe and Samuel Richardson was immense. The actual printing layout of the book, its form and structure, was unique. Its unconventionality, the use of inserts such as marbled paper, blank leaves, deliberate spacing, the black mourning page, scrolls and curlicues all attested to its newness and originality. Indeed, many see the work as a forerunner of much Modernist and Post Modernist literature.

RARE. The first edition of Robert Walker's humorous prose in Lancashire Dialect was published in 1798 by W. Cowdroy.

This second edition is superior in format in containing the engraved portrait frontispiece, pictorial title-page and additional plate whereas the earlier edition simply contained woodcuts. This 1802 edition contains an additional Dedication sated December 24 1801 and a Glossary of Lancashire Dialect. A further edition was published in 1812 and George Cruikshank illustrated an edition in 1828. Lancashire developed into a major commercial and industrial region during the Industrial Revolution encompassing hundreds of mill towns and collieries. By the 1830s around 85% of cotton produced worldwide came from Lancashire. The county had a strong history of dialect literature, especially poetry and writings such as *Plebeian Politics* that commented on the poverty of the working class and rural communities.

The Castle of Otranto was first published anonymously in 1764 and for the second edition Horace Walpole added the word 'Gothic' to the title-page. Generally regarded as the first Gothic novel it was immensely popular and reissued many times. This 1796 edition with its fine coloured plates and elaborate borders is one of the most interesting. The six plates were drawn by 'a lady' (Miss Anne Millicent Clarke) and engraved by Birrell in July 1793 to accompany editions of that year and issued in 1795 by Sivrac. They were reissued by Jefferys for this edition printed on Whatman wove paper in 1796, coloured by hand and with the addition of elaborate ornamental gilt borders which obscure the original imprint at the foot of each plate.

The first edition of *The Arte of Rhetorike* was issued in 1553, printed by Richard Grafton, the King's printer. Thomas Wilson prepared a new edition of this popular textbook in 1560 prefaced with 'A Prologue to the reader' detailing his recent banishment and dangerous exploits abroad during the closing reign of Queen Mary. Subsequent editions were issued in 1562, 1563 and 1567 testifying to its success and wide readership. Warton called it 'The first system of criticism in our language'. *The rule of Reason* was first published in 1553. Thomas Wilson was born c.1525 in Lincolnshire and was promoted by William Cecil, Lord Burghley. Educated at Eton and Kings College, Cambridge, he was introduced into the circle of Roger Ascham and other notable humanist scholars. It was through Wilson's textbooks that much of their teaching reached a wider audience and students

The first edition of Mary Wollstonecraft's fictional telling of her time as a governess to the daughters of an aristocratic family in Dublin was issued in 1788. This, however, is the first edition with the engraved plates by William Blake. Copies of this edition were also issued in 1791 without the engraved plates at a lesser cost. This important work by Mary Wollstonecraft, today regarded as one of the founding feminists, in which she advocates education and freedom of expression and life for women, was published the year before her best-known work A Vindication on the Rights of Women, 1792. William Blake's fine engravings work perfectly in harmony with Wollstonecraft's beliefs, breaking from the contemporary rococo or pastoral style idealising and limiting women.
