Welcome to our summary of LinkAble's activities during the financial year 2017-18. I am pleased to say that, even in these times of limited public sector funding, LinkAble continues to provide much needed activities and support for people with learning disabilities and autism. The year has not been without its challenges, but I am proud to say that LinkAble has met these and emerged the better for them. The consistent support that we have had from our service users and their families bears testimony to how highly LinkAble's services are valued, and the difference that they make to the lives of our beneficiaries.

We remain indebted to our enthusiastic and dedicated staff and volunteers, who are focused on delivering great services to our clients. Without their energy and commitment LinkAble would not be able to deliver such a varied and interesting programme of activities. 2017 saw the recruitment of a new CEO – Alison Keeley. Her commitment to the charity and drive mean that LinkAble is in a strong position with a clear vision and plans for the future.

During the year we have said farewell to long-serving members Deborah Fieldus and Peter Stock, both of whom continue to volunteer for LinkAble. With the help and goodwill of staff, volunteers, trustees and stakeholders, LinkAble continues to make a valued improvement to the quality of life of our service users. We are indebted to everyone who helps make this possible.

Mission and Core Values

Since 1989 LinkAble has been helping children, young people and adults with learning disabilities and autism, by providing a range of sporting and social activities as well as valuable life skills in and around the community. People with learning disabilities and autism face many barriers that can exclude them from mainstream society. We help break down those barriers by supporting service users and offering them opportunities to engage in meaningful and stimulating activities.

Objectives and Activities

The Board of Trustees determines and regularly updates LinkAble's strategic objectives. At the annual Strategy Day in November 2017 the Trustee Board refreshed the charity's mission, vision and values (set out above) and identified a number of strategic priorities. Performance against these are reviewed by Trustees on a six-monthly basis. A summary of the strategic objectives for 2018-20 is available on request.

Principle Activities

LinkAble is a Woking and Surrey Heath based charity serving children and adults with learning disabilities and autism. We support our service users through programmes of activity delivered at our base, The Link, and at venues in the community. Anyone with a learning disability and/or autism can join, without need for formal diagnosis.

We pride ourselves on a 'person-centred' approach, treating everyone as an individual with specific needs. Where appropriate, we offer one-to-one support. Our service users' experience is our paramount concern and every activity is designed with their interests, needs and abilities in mind.

Our Services

We have three service strands; children (5 - 11), youth (11 - 17) and adults (18 plus). Age is not the only indicator, and people access the most appropriate service. Transitioning services are carefully managed to ensure a positive experience for the individual.

- The children's service allows younger service users to play, experiment, learn, take risks and form meaningful friendships in a safe environment.
- Our youth service supports individuals to access activities and experiences that they might not be able to access without the support of our specially trained staff.
- As our service users reach adulthood, there is often a drastic reduction in available support from the local authority. Our day time services focus on activities which offer opportunities for our adult service users to develop their independence. Our evening services tend to feature more user-led social and recreational activities such as swimming, restaurant visits and karaoke. We also run a regular nightclub evening which frequently attracts over 250 people.

LinkAble's services run 7 days a week and in 50 weeks of the year. Outside of term time our schemes for children, youth and adults offer a wide range of exciting and engaging opportunities. Activities on offer include kayaking, visits to farms and parks, art and craft activities and trips to the seaside. These services also provide valuable respite time for families. One of our parents put it best when they said 'LinkAble is the difference between coping and not coping'.

Our services focus on social inclusion, group engagement and individual development. Sporting activities are not overtly competitive, focusing on participation, teamwork and health benefits. Many activities take part in the local community giving people with learning disabilities and autism a visible presence in society, promoting integration.

An underlying theme to all our programs and services is for our users to grow in confidence and selfbelief as well as forging long lasting relationships with staff and other service users as they participate in these various activities.

We receive some limited funding from Surrey County Council for the services we provide to under 16 year olds. All the programmes for adults are entirely funded by fundraising and contributions from service users.

Review of the Year

2017-18 was a year which provided challenges for the Charity. Changes in senior personnel, coupled with uncertainty about future Surrey County Council funding, created a hiatus in the early months of the year. Confirmation of our grant funding came through in June, followed by the successful recruitment of our new CEO in July.

There were some operational problems during the first week of summer schemes which caused Ofsted to temporarily suspend LinkAble's registration. Staff and trustees rose to the challenge. Following three weeks of intense activity, LinkAble regained its Ofsted registration. Programmes resumed for the autumn with improvements and developments in place which stemmed from the resolution of the issues highlighted over the summer. Our clients continue to have confidence in and support the charity.

Despite there being some challenges during the year, LinkAble and its service users continue to achieve great things. These are highlighted in Achievements for the Year below.

Achievements for the Year 2017-18

- We were successful in bidding for a 3 year contract to deliver services for Under 18s on behalf of Surrey County Council. The new contract has enabled us to increase the length of our term time Saturday services for under 18s from 4 hours to 6 hours.
- Our choir, the High Notes, performs regularly at public venues and celebrated its 10th anniversary year. The High Notes became the first learning disability choir to pass the Associated Board of Royal Schools of Music choral examination.
- The LinkAble drama group ActAbles opened events at the Woking Dance and Drama Festival.
- In collaboration with Woking Scouts we successfully bid for funding from Surrey County Council. After significant preparation LinkScout held its first meeting in February 2018 with 4 service users attending and numbers continue to grow.
- The We Can Do Anything adult group continues to diversify the range of activities on offer and remains popular with adult service users. The group has made links with a local building site which they are visiting bi-monthly to observe progress. They also aim to engage in activity which gives back to the community, making the poppies which are sold by the British Legion to raise funds leading up to Remembrance Day and working with a Ranger to help manage areas of Horsell Common.

With the help and efforts of our staff and volunteers, we were able to support 302 people, through a total of 748 different activities or group sessions. Overall people attended 19,547 hours of supported activities:

Public Benefit

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance from the Charity Commission regarding public benefit and the reporting of public benefit. In the view of the Trustees the Charity complies fully with guidance on both points: this is evidenced by the description of our aims and our achievements set out above.

Governance, Structure and Management

Governing Document

LinkAble is a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association which establishes its objects, powers and governing rules. We are regulated by the Charity Commission, and adhere to its guidance regarding effective governance.

Governance Structure

LinkAble has a Board of up to 15 Trustees, although we are currently operating with 8. The Trustee Board meets periodically through the year to review progress against LinkAble's Strategic Implementation Plan. The Board delegates work to 3 committees - Finance, People & Property, and Marketing & Fundraising. Risk is monitored through regular meetings between the CEO and the trustee responsible for this area. Trustees come from a variety of professional backgrounds and contribute a wide range of skills and experience. They also regularly attend training opportunities to ensure effective fulfilment of their role.

The day-to-day management of the organisation is carried out by the CEO who is accountable to the Trustees, who carry ultimate legal responsibility for the Charity.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

LinkAble has a formal recruitment policy and appointment process under which potential candidates are considered and selected. New Trustees are identified in a number of ways including advertising and targeted recruitment. The Trustee Board regularly reviews its collective skills and experience against the needs of the Charity's business to ensure that it has appropriate expertise to enable the Charity to deliver its objectives. The charity has taken measures to recruit new trustees with a view to creating a board of 10-12 in 2018.

Trustee Induction and Training

LinkAble has a program of induction and training for trustees that is clearly set out in the Trustee Recruitment and Appointment Policy.

Risk Management

The Board takes seriously its responsibility for ensuring the safe, secure and professional operation of the Charity. We maintain and regularly review a risk register, which identifies the key risks to which the charity is or could be exposed. The risk register is based on the Charity Commission's template and guidance.

LinkAble has established measures to control and mitigate the likelihood and impact of identified risks. Strategic risks are reviewed as part of the development of the Strategic Implementation Plan; operational risks are managed through appropriate policies and training, and form part of a regular report to the Trustees from the CEO. Financial risk is managed through policies, budgeting and reporting; in addition the financial risks and implications of any proposal are carefully reviewed before a decision is reached.

Although supported by the CEO and the Trustee with special oversight of risk, final responsibility for the management of risk rests with the Trustee Board.

Financial Review

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31st March 2018 shows a deficit of £92,856. This deficit follows the charity's inability to deliver a significant number of hours related to the Surrey County Council contract in August 2017 and the subsequent loss of part of the Surrey County Council grant income and service user's fees. Our records show that without this loss of income, the charity would have ended the year with a deficit of £20,000 as budgeted.

The deficit for year was a known outcome of the issues in August 2017, following which management and trustees worked to quantify the financial cost and confirm that the charity was able to continue operating. Measures have been put in place to ensure that a repeat of the circumstances which lead to this loss of income cannot occur.

Management and trustees made the decision to amend the reserves policy to allow greater flexibility on the short term use of cash reserves.

Funding Sources

LinkAble receives grant funding, principally from Surrey County Council, towards the cost of our core activities for children.

Fundraising is vital to be able to operate the services that we currently provide, and we are grateful for all of the individual, corporate and regular donations we have received. We are also grateful for the fundraising efforts of many people and groups in the community, and the trusts and foundations who support us.

Finally, people attending LinkAble services contribute to part of the cost of providing the service.

Reserves

LinkAble's reserves as at 31st March 2018 were £149,799. Reserves are held in order to ensure the continuity of service provision as well as enabling LinkAble to take advantage of opportunities when they arise.

LinkAble's reserves policy was previously set at the equivalent of 6 months operating costs, however the trustees agreed to change this to a more practical equivalent of 3-6 months operating costs to allow for short term fluctuations in cash requirements.

The trustees review the reserves policy regularly to ensure it is set at the appropriate level.

Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also the Directors of LinkAble Woking Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of frauds and other irregularities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Trustees elected to provide depreciation at the following annual rate in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Motor vehicles

20% on costs

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
