Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

The year 2019/2020 has ended by being the most unusual year for every single one of us. When I took over as Chair at the February Board meeting, none of us realised how drastically things were going to change in just a few short weeks. I am immensely proud of everything that LinkAble has achieved in its 30th birthday year. We delivered crucial services and various successful birthday events right up to the point when we had to shut our building and then our wonderful team adapted quickly to deliver as much as we could online. I am constantly struck with how committed, innovative and hard-working our staff are. They really believe in what we do at LinkAble because they see directly how much difference it makes to the lives of our service users and their families. Like all small charities we face constant financial challenges, but our supporters continue to pull out all the stops for us and have kept us going through very changeable times.

This would have been a year of change in any case. We have been very lucky to have Brenda Infante as Chair for many years and we regret her departure not only for the loss of her skills and knowledge but also because she has been such a great friend and supporter of LinkAble over the years. We also have had several other changes on the Board of Trustees and amongst our office staff. Whilst it is always sad to say goodbye to those who have left, it is gratifying that people are so keen to join. I am thankful to be working with a team that has such breadth and depth of skill.

Other changes have included a continuing revamp of our IT systems. We have moved to Office 365 and are close to going live with a new booking system which we believe will make things much easier for our families and our staff. The work of reviewing our programmes and making improvements for our service users is ongoing. I was recently asked by a potential Trustee what I liked most about being a Trustee. My answer was that when I attend LinkAble events, I am always delighted to see how happy our service users, staff and supporters are and how they are enjoying themselves together. The goodwill in the room is palpable and it is easy to see how valuable those interactions are for everyone, not just our service users. The value of what we do can be hard to quantify but it is easy to see.

In terms of our services we recognise that, as ambitious as we are, we cannot achieve everything alone. LinkAble is continually forging partnerships with other community groups to widen the range of what we can offer to our service users. We are grateful to all the local businesses who have worked with us this year, supporting our service users and fundraising for us. A great example of this has been our partnership with Galliford Try who have continued to raise much-needed funds for us whilst they also welcome adult service users to their construction site to for work experience and volunteering.

We are indebted to all the trusts, corporate and statutory bodies and individuals who have supported LinkAble through the year. Each and every contribution makes a difference, and we are grateful for it. We simply would not be able to continue the work we do without their generosity.

My personal thanks to all the staff, volunteers and Trustees of LinkAble. We have been running for 30 years because your dedication and energy allows us to continue to help local people with learning disabilities live healthy, happy and independent lives.

Mission and Core Values

LinkAble is celebrating its 30th year of supporting children, young people and adults with learning disabilities. The range of sporting and social activities which the charity provides and supports continues to grow. People with learning disabilities face many barriers that can exclude them from mainstream society. We help break down those barriers by supporting service users and offering them opportunities to engage in meaningful and stimulating activities whilst making links with their local community.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

LinkAble's strategic objectives are regularly updated by the Board of Trustees. At the annual Away Day in November 2019 the Trustees reviewed a range of factors which had contributed to 2019-20 being a challenging year financially for the charity. A number of strategic priorities were identified focusing around increasing income and ensuring that all charity activity is carefully scrutinised from a financial standpoint to ensure the charity runs as efficiently as possible. Positive outcomes in relation to these strategies and the advent of the Covid 19 pandemic has seen these strategies develop to demonstrate the charity's desire to continue to provide play and leisure services for children and adults with learning disabilities in Woking and Surrey Heath to the best of our ability. Performance against these objectives is reviewed by Trustees on a six-monthly basis.

Principle Activities

LinkAble is based in Woking and delivers services from its base in Woking and at venues in the community in Woking and Surrey Heath. The charity supports children and adults with learning disabilities by running a range of groups and activities. Anyone with a learning disability can join, without need for formal diagnosis.

We seek input from service users and their families when creating programmes and developing existing ones. We ensure that there are a wide range of activities which are suitable for all our service users.

Our Services

At LinkAble there are three main service strands: children (5-11), youth (11-18) and adults (18 plus). We carry out meetings with all those wishing to access our services and use the information gathered as part of the process to maximise the extent to which our services can be tailored to meet the needs of our service users. Transitioning services (open to those aged 16 and above) allow service users continuity of service as they move from childhood to adulthood.

- Our children's services run on Saturdays and during school holidays. They offer younger service users opportunities to play, experiment, learn, take risks and form meaningful friendships in a safe environment supported by specially trained staff
- Our youth service runs on Saturdays, in the school holidays and during the week at Youth Clubs. Individuals
 can access activities and experiences that they might not be able to access without the support of our specially
 trained staff
- LinkAble's services for adults with learning disabilities can be broadly sorted into two groups. Day time services tend to be used by adults with higher needs and focus on providing new experiences and accessing supported activities which give back to the community. Our evening services generally feature more user-led social and recreational activities such as sporting activities, theatre visits and cooking together. We also run activities for those interested in the arts with our singing group meeting on a Tuesday evening and our drama groups meeting on a Sunday. We run bi-monthly nightclub evenings which frequently attract over 200 people.

LinkAble runs services 7 days a week and in 50 weeks of the year. All of our services focus on social inclusion, group engagement and individual development. We often arrange for activities to take place in the local community giving people with learning disabilities a visible presence in society and promoting integration. We see our service users growing in confidence and self-belief as well as forging long lasting friendships with other service users as they participate in the activities we run. LinkAble not only supports our service users – it provides a vital respite for family and friends who care for them.

Our services for Under 18s are part funded by Surrey County Council with the remainder of the funding for these services coming from contributions from service users and the charity's own fundraising efforts. With no funding from the local authority available for adult services these programmes are entirely funded by fundraising and contributions from service users.

In March 2020 LinkAble made the decision to temporarily suspend face to face services in line with Government Guidance in relation to Covid 19. We remained in contact with our service users and their families and offered a wide range of support. A key part of our support for our service users and their families at this time was the development of our virtual offerings which we began to deliver in April 2020. For our Under 18s we offered a range of services which were adapted to the needs of individual children. These included weekly zoom calls, bespoke videos and general videos and resources which were shared through social media and on our website. For our adults we introduced daily groups on weekdays, delivered via zoom where they could meet, learn new skills and develop friendships. The groups had a different focus each day and included a zumba session, art and crafts, and cookery. The virtual services have been very well received with many families and service users sharing with us the benefits they have seen for interacting with LinkAble in this way.

Highlights for the Year 2019-20

- 'We are Woking' supported LinkAble by making a film which highlights the work of the charity. The film has been widely shared on social media and can be viewed here LinkAble We Are Woking Film
- LinkAble developed its links with Woking Twin Towns Committee with the CEO, Alison Keeley, visiting Rastatt
 in Germany to explore the opportunity for service users from LinkAble and service users from a similar
 organisation in Germany to engage in exchange visits
- LinkAble delivered its Disability Awareness session to several organisations including schools and branches of the WI
- LinkAble held its Gala Ball for the first time in three years as part of the 30th Anniversary celebrations raising over £20,000 for the charity
- LinkAble received its first ever place in the London Marathon through the charity ballot. So far our runner, Kim Blondell, has raised over £4,000 for the charity even though the race has been postponed due to Covid 19
- Five runners undertook the Surrey Half Marathon on behalf of LinkAble, raising funds and the profile of the charity
- A booking system which will meet the charity's needs was identified and began to be developed ready for use in 2020/21
- LinkAble received a generous legacy donation from the estate of Timothy Bebb who had previously been involved with the charity as a Trustee
- LinkAble became one of two nominated charities to benefit from Hoebridge Golf Club's fundraising in 2020
- Office efficiency was improved by moving much of the charity's IT function across to Office 365

With the help and efforts our staff and volunteers, we were able to support 263 people, through a total of 877 different activities or group sessions. Overall people attended 25,268 hours of supported activities:

We expect to need to be flexible in face of an unpredictable world and so we will continue to innovate in the types of services we offer as well as their delivery methods to meet our service users' needs.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

LinkAble is a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association which establishes its objects, powers and governing rules. We are regulated by the Charity Commission and adhere to its guidance regarding effective governance.

Governance Structure

LinkAble has a Board of up to 15 Trustees, although we are currently operating with 10. The Trustee Board meets periodically through the year to review progress against LinkAble's Strategic Implementation Plan. The Trustee Board delegates work to 5 committees - Finance, People & Property, Marketing & Fundraising, Risk & Governance and Programmes.

The day-to-day management of the organisation is carried out by the CEO who is accountable to the Trustees, who carry ultimate legal responsibility for the Charity.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

LinkAble has a formal recruitment policy and appointment process under which potential candidates are considered and selected. New Trustees are identified in a number of ways including advertising and targeted recruitment. The Trustee Board regularly reviews its collective skills and experience against the needs of the Charity's business to ensure that it has appropriate expertise to enable the Charity to deliver its objectives. Several Trustees have left and several have joined this year resulting in 10 Trustees in total at the end of this financial year.

Trustee Induction and Training

LinkAble has a program of induction and training for Trustees that is set out in the Trustee Recruitment and Appointment Policy.

Risk Management

The Board of Trustees takes seriously its responsibility for ensuring the safe, secure and professional operation of the Charity. We maintain and regularly review a risk register, which identifies the key risks to which the charity is or could be exposed. The risk register is based on the Charity Commission's template and guidance. Current principal challenges and associated risks include:

LinkAble has established measures to control and mitigate the likelihood and impact of identified risks. Strategic risks are reviewed as part of the development of the Strategic Implementation Plan; operational risks are managed through appropriate policies and training, and form part of a regular report to the Trustees from the CEO. Financial risk is managed through policies, budgeting and reporting; in addition, the financial risks and implications of any proposal are carefully reviewed before a decision is reached.

Although supported by the CEO and the Trustee with special oversight of risk, final responsibility for the management of risk rests with the Trustee Board.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Financial Review

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31st March 2020 shows a surplus of £47,633.

Funding Sources

LinkAble receives grant funding, principally from Surrey County Council, towards the cost of our core activities for children.

Fundraising is vital to be able to operate the services that we currently provide, and we are grateful for each of the individual, corporate and regular donations we have received. We are also grateful for the fundraising efforts of many people and groups in the community, and the trusts and foundations who support us.

Finally, people attending LinkAble services contribute to part of the cost of providing the service.

Reserves

LinkAble's reserves as at 31st March 2020 were £197,476 of which £196,150 was unrestricted. Of this, £30,000 has been designated for capital improvements to the building and for innovation of services (2019: Reserves of £149,843 – all unrestricted). Reserves are held in order to ensure the continuity of service provision as well as enabling LinkAble to take advantage of opportunities when they arise.

LinkAble's reserves policy is to maintain free cash reserves of between 3 & 6 months operating costs to allow for short term fluctuations in cash requirements. The current level of free cash reserves represents approximately 4 months of unrestricted operating costs and is therefore at the target level.

The Trustees review the reserves policy regularly to ensure it is set at the appropriate level.

Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also the Directors of LinkAble Woking Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP);
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of frauds and other irregularities.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy or note.

The trustees consider that there are no significant areas of estimation or judgement.

b) Public benefit entity

The charitable company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

c) Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

The Trustees have reviewed the charity's financial position, taking into account current performance, the satisfactory levels of reserves and cash at year end and projections. They have considered future plans, along with internal processes and systems for managing financial and operational risks. As a result, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources and infrastructure to continue operating for the foreseeable future

The 2020/21 budget has been amended to reflect the anticipated impact of Covid 19, and the level of funding required to allow LinkAble to continue provision of its services. We have been able to take advantage of the government Job Retention Scheme and have continued to be supported by local government funding whilst we delivered online services. We resumed face to face services in June having undertaken risk assessments and assured we were operating in line with government guidance. We continue to monitor all relevant government guidance and make appropriate changes to our risk assessment and delivery protocols as needed. We have been fortunate to receive emergency funding from a number of granting bodies and with the legacy money received in 2019/20 and our liquid cash reserves, we are confident that we will be able to meet our on-going activities over the next 12 months.

d) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and that the amount can be measured reliably.

Income received in advance of the provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

e) Fund accounting

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor within the objects of the charity. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income received or generated for the charitable purposes

f) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

g) Allocation of support costs

Expenditure is allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned on a basis consistent with the use of relevant resources.

h) Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at original historical cost less aggregate depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset on a straight line basis over its estimated useful life. All assets are currently fully depreciated.

i) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

i) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments. Cash balances exclude any funds held on behalf of service users.

k) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.
