Did you know?

- Fewer than 3 in 10 (28.0%) children and young people aged 8 to 18 said that they read daily in 2023
- When asked what would make them want to read, 2 in 5 said that having books recommended to them would do this. 1 in 3 said being given books or having books that represent them would make them want to read. 1 in 4 said they would read more if family or friends talked about books.

Why is it important to share books?



Why did you want to be a children's book author and what inspired you?

I like entertaining people and I think kids are the best audience. I read Mr Gum for the first time when I first started writing for children and it really inspired me to get super creative. It's a triumph of hilarity and proves that you can never have too much quirk!

What is the best thing about being an author?

Making people laugh! And being able to give readers something that will transport them to a completely different world. I love that books can provide a bit of an escape when the real world feels a bit dark and gloomy.

Why did you choose a sausage dog as your main character?

I've always loved sausage dogs and how they seem so confident – they're not at all held back by the fact that they're small. So, it just seemed natural (and funny!) that a sausage dog would have big ambitions! Sausage dogs have so much personality and I really liked the idea of capturing some of that in Michael.

What books did you enjoy reading as a child?

I enjoyed reading Roald Dahl, especially Charlie and the Chocolate Factory and Matilda. And I loved anything with animals in!

How long did it take you to write this book?

Quite a long time! I was working full time when I started writing Michael so had to squeeze in writing sessions at the weekend, on my lunch breaks, or whenever I could find the time. It probably took about 3 years and I definitely had to embrace the spirit of Michael's resilience to keep going when I was tired or finding something hard!

What are your top tips to any children who would like to be an author one day?

Write lots! And let your imagination run wild! Also, I find it helps to read my story out loud so I can hear which bits sound good and spot which bits might need changing if the sentences don't flow easily. Sometimes I get a friend to read it out for me.



What is your favourite book with a dog in (other than your own)?

I have loads of favourites! For kids who enjoy Michael, there's a book called There's a Dog in My Brain that I love – it's a super funny body-swap comedy about a boy called Danny who ends up swapping lives with his dog, Dudley. I'm also a big fan of the Peanut, Butter and Cracker series, which follows the lives of two pet dogs and a cat in a graphic novel format.





Are you writing another children's book at the moment?

I've just finished writing Michael's second adventure – Michael the Incredible Super- Sleuth Sausage Dog, where Michael has to turn detective when Susan the Chocolate Labrador gets dognapped. And I'm currently working on something brand new, but it's top secret for a little while!


