

FREE ways to get your children to love reading this summer

What is the summer slide?

The 'summer slide' isn't just about playground fun; it's about children forgetting some of what they learned in school during the six week holidays. Studies show that children can forget about a month's worth of learning over the summer and over the last eight years, research has also indicated fewer children are reading during the holidays. So when school starts again, teachers spend a month or more ensuring everyone has caught up.

But there's good news - you can stop the summer slide by reading! This newsletter will give you lots of ideas of free ways to keep your child reading this summer and avoid that summer slide.

AT HOME

- Create a cosy reading den using whatever you have at home. You could make it more special by reading in the dark with a torch or having hot chocolate or snacks in your den whilst reading.
- Turn the subtitles on when your child watches TV or films.
- Read to your child every day. Try reading different things: magazines, comics, nonfiction, picture books (even if they are older), joke books and newspaper articles.

- Libraries are amazing places to get children reading. Not only are there thousands of books you can borrow for free but during the summer holidays they also run an annual summer reading challenge. Your child can collect stickers each time they read a book and if they complete the challenge (six books), they'll get a medal and certificate.
- How about reading in different places outside?
- Chatting to your child about what you can see on a trip to the park or a day out will really benefit their reading by developing their vocabulary and understanding.
