Workforce sustainability: recent policy developments and their implications for careers thinking/

Chris Warhurst



Chris Warhurst is Professor and Director of the Institute for Employment Research at the University of Warwick in the UK. He is an Associate Research Fellow of SKOPE at the University of Oxford, a Fellow of the Royal Society and, until recently, a Trustee and Board Member of the Tavistock Institute in London.

Chris has 20 years' experience of running centres/institutes with IER and, previously, as Founding Director of the Scottish Centre for Employment Research at the University of Strathclyde in Glasgow. He was Chair of the Management Committee of Human Relations and was co-editor of Work, Employment and Society. He is the UK lead of a pan-European EU-funded research project examining the future of work and welfare in the digital age (BEYOND 4.0).

Solo and with colleagues, Chris has published 50+ scientific journal articles, 60+ book chapters, 17 books, 50+ reports for government, charities and other bodies, and 40 non-academic articles. According to Google Scholar, he has over 8000 citations. He has also secured 70+ research grants and awards from research councils, government and third-stream funders.

Chris is/has been an expert advisor to the UK, Scottish and Australian Governments as well as to Eurofound, the OECD, Oxfam Scotland and the Scottish Living Wage campaign. He initiated the policy turn to job quality in Scotland in the 2000s and his influence formally recognised by a Scottish Parliament Inquiry into Work, Wages and Wellbeing. Over 2017-18, he was also a member of the Carnegie Trust/RSA Short Life Expert Group on Job Quality, constituted to respond to the UK Government's Taylor Review recommendations on job quality. He has long-established, internationally-recognised expertise in job quality and skills.

Ans de Vos



Ans De Vos holds a Master's degree in Psychology (KULeuven) and an additional degree in Human Resource Management (University of Antwerp, now Antwerp Management School). She started her career at Vlerick Business School in 1996 and received her PhD in 2002 from the Faculty of Economics and Business Administration at the University of Ghent. Her doctoral research focused on the psychological contract among new employees, i.e. the expectations newcomers have about the terms of their employment relationship and how these evolve during the socialization period.

From the start of her academic career, Ans De Vos has been fascinated by careers. More specifically, her mission is to make people more competent in directing their own careers so they can take responsibility for their professional lives. She researches how a winwin can be created between organisations and their employees and this within the broader societal issues surrounding careers and work in general, in order to achieve sustainable career policies.

She particularly studies evolutions such as digitalization and flexible work and their impact on careers, both from an individual and organizational perspective. She advises organizations on career management challenges and is a well-known speaker on this topic.

Ans is currently a professor at Antwerp Management School, where she holds the SD Worx Chair 'Next generation work: Creating Sustainable Careers'. She also coordinates the expertise centre Next Generation Work and is associate dean Education at AMS.

Ans teaches in full-time master programs (including Master in Strategic HRM and Master in Management), various executive masters and 'company-specific' programs. She is also academically responsible for Global Leadership Skills, the personal development track in the full-time master's programs in which students are guided in developing self-knowledge, personal growth and self-leadership with a view to their future careers.

Miriam Dimsits



Miriam Dimsits is an associate professor at VIA University College in Aarhus, Denmark, where she teaches and trains adult students in professional career guidance at the School of Continuing Education, VIA UC. She took a master's degree in religion, culture, and aesthetics (Aarhus University), at the time thought of as a step towards becoming a journalist writing about cultural phenomena. Planned happenstance, however, led her to a career working with different guidance practices, from young people with different social problems, struggling for survival, meaning and coherence, to young adults pursuing, doubting, choosing (and dropping out of) higher education. This led her to take a master's degree in professional career guidance (Aarhus University), which became a steppingstone to an academic career with teaching, research, and development in the field of career guidance.

Miriam has focussed on career guidance and its potential to change both people and societies. In addition, she is interested in the negative impacts of how societies are displacing nature, exceeding planetary boundaries and thereby threatening our own living conditions, through the way we produce, eat, consume and work. This has led her to pick up on associate Professor Peter Plant's work on green guidance and develop his ideas further into theory and practice for environmentally sustainable career guidance.

David is Head of Sustainable Careers at WWF-UK. His work focuses on equipping young people with the skills and values to enter into sustainable careers.

Shane McLoughlin (Wed 03 Jul Workshop Session 3 Option 4, 11.15am)




Dr. Shane McLoughlin is a Chartered Psychologist at the Jubilee Centre for Character and Virtues, University of Birmingham.
