THE SHOW SITE

The Show will be held at Ayr Racecourse in the Ayrshire Suite extending out to the permanent marquees and surrounding grounds. The racecourse has been a successful venue for many various events and the generous accommodation provides suitable cover from inclement weather conditions. Ayr Racecourse is located in Whitletts Road, Ayr. KA8 0JE and is easily accessed by taking the A719 turning off the Ayr Town Centre or by following the A77 or B743 to Whitletts Roundabout and taking the Ayr A719 town centre exit.

TRAINS AND BUSES

Ayr is served by excellent rail connections to Glasgow Central with a half hourly service throughout. Similarly a good service to Girvan and Stranraer is also provided. SHOW REGULATIONS

- All entries should be received by Monday 11th August. Late entries may only be accepted at the Show Committee's discretion. The Show Committee reserve the right to refuse any entry without giving any reason or explanation.
- 2. All competitors are held to declare that the subjects exhibited by them are of their own development and horticultural exhibits have been in their possession for at least two months. Any infraction of this rule will disqualify the exhibitor.
- 3. All vegetables must be clean, sound and properly dressed. Undue dressing will disqualify.
- 4. All plants should be free from pests and diseases. Any plant considered by the Judges to be carrying such will be removed from the hall.
- 5. Unless articles are legibly and correctly named any awards will be withheld.
- 6. The show area will be open for placement of exhibits from 17.00 on the day prior to the show and all exhibits must be in place by 07.00 on the day of the show. Cut blooms must be shown in vases provided.
- 7. Judging will take place between 07.30 and 10.00 on the opening day of the show.
- 8. Any protests must be lodged with the Committee in writing before 12.00 noon on the opening day of the show along with a forfeitable deposit of £10.00 if the protest is not upheld. The Show Committee decision will be final.
- 9. The Show Committee will direct the placing of all exhibits and the exhibitors must obey their instructions. No exhibit shall be removed prior to the closure of the show without the Show Committee's agreement.
- 10. The show will close at 17.00 on Saturday. All competitors with removal tickets must prominently display these for security purposes and remove their own exhibits from the venue by 18.00. Any items remaining after that time will be disposed of by the Committee.

- 11. The Ayr and District Flower Show nor the Show Committee nor their respective officers or sub-contractors shall be responsible for any accidents, damage or loss, howsoever arising, that may happen to a) exhibitors or competitors or contractors/sub-contractors of exhibitors or competitors while they are entering or leaving the venue; and b) animals, articles or property of whatsoever nature in or while being brought into or taken out of the venue. Exhibitors and competitors shall be solely responsible for any loss, damage or injury caused by themselves or their contractor/sub-contractor by animals, articles and property belonging to them; and exhibitors and competitor shall free and relieve the said Flower Show of all claims for loss, damage or injury, howsoever arising, and shall indemnify the said Flower Show and their respective officers against all legal proceedings which may follow thereon. All exhibits, boxes, stands and other items left at the show will be disposed of by the Committee.
- 12. The submission of an entry form by an exhibitor shall imply that he/she agrees to observe and conform to all rules and regulations in connection with the show.
- 13. There must be no vehicle movement within the show ground before 17.15 on the last day of the show.

PRIZE SCHEDULE

A warm welcome is extended to all exhibitors to Ayr Racecourse in 2025.

As in previous years no monetary award will be made in the adult classes.

The show organisers will again provide *Premium Keepsake Prizes* for the major class in a section and a *Keepsake Prize* for the best exhibits for the section.

As in previous years, cash prizes for First, Second and Third will be provided in the Junior Section.

Certain Societies are providing trophies within their section which will remain the property of that Society. In general these trophies are only awarded to members of these Societies and their award is at the discretion of each of these Societies.

Ingredients:

- 113g/4oz butter or margarine, 113g/4oz light muscovado sugar,
- 113g/4oz golden syrup, 113/4oz black treacle, 113g/4oz self-raising flour,
- 113g/4oz wholemeal self raising flour, 3 tsp ground ginger, 1 egg, 150ml/5oz milk.

Method: Preheat oven to 180°/160° fan/325°F/Gas Mark 4

Gently melt butter or margarine, sugar, syrup and treacle and cool slightly. Mix flours and ginger. Mix egg and milk. Pour the wet ingredients into the flours and mix well. Pour mix into a prepared circular cake tin, 18-21cm diameter, and bake for approximately 35 minutes.

Timing is for conventional ovens and is only a guide as appliances vary.

- 1. ALL CLASSES TO BE JUDGED UNDER British Fuchsia Society Rules 2023.
- 2. A *Beginner* is a competitor who has never won a First, Second or Third prize for Fuchsias at any recognized Fuchsia Show.
- 3. A *Novice* is a competitor who has never won a First prize for Fuchsias at any recognised Fuchsia Show, with the exception of a beginner's class.
- 4. All plants must have been the property of the exhibitor for at least three months prior to the show. This also applies to plants from which blooms have been taken for showing. All plants must be shown in the pot size in which they have been grown. All (Fuchsia) plants may be bush or shrub grown unless stated otherwise, and must be shown in terracotta coloured pots except for entries in Beginner, Novice and Junior.
- 5. Standard (Fuchsias). The stem length of a standard is measured from soil level to the underside of the first lateral branch.

This stem should be free of all growth and measure as follows:-

Full Standard - not less than (760mm) and not more than (1070mm).

Half Standard - not less than (460mm) and not more than (760mm).

Quarter Standard - not less than (250mm) and not more than (460mm).

- 6. All plants should be free from pests and diseases. Any plant considered by the Judges to be carrying such will be removed from the hall.
- 7. A BUSH is an exhibit which must be developed on a single stem not less than 10mm and not exceeding 40mm. The entire exhibit should be covered with a healthy abundance of foliage and flower which should be of the size expected of the cultivar being shown. The exhibit should present a balanced shape when viewed from all angles.
- 8. A SHRUB is an exhibit with more than one shoot emerging from below compost level. It can also be developed from more than one plant. The entire exhibit should be covered with a healthy abundance of foliage and flower which should be of the size expected of the cultivar being shown. The exhibit should present a balance shape when viewed from all angles.
- 9. A FULL HANGING BASKET should be TOP planted only, and may contain more than one plant. Growth should fill the centre and top of the basket and surge over the edge in a sweeping cascade. Uniform growth with an abundance of healthy foliage and flower and should continue to at least the depth of the basket, and be evenly distributed from the crown to the end of the trailing growths. The exhibit is to be viewed from the top and sides when displaced in an elevated position. The container should not be visible when viewed at eye level. The basket must be of open mesh construction and be commercially manufactured as a hanging basket. The top must be circular in shape, should not be less than 300mm and not exceed 410mm in diameter. The maximum depth allowed in 250mm.

A HALF HANGING BASKET should be **TOP** planted only, and may contain more than one plant. Growth should fill the centre and top of the basket and surge over the edge in a sweeping cascade. Uniform growth with an abundance of

healthy foliage and flower and should continue to at least the depth of the basket, and be evenly distributed from the crown to the end of the trailing growths. The exhibit is to be viewed from the top and sides when displayed in an elevated position. The container should not be visible when viewed at eye level.

The basket must be of open mesh and be commercially manufactured as a hanging basket. The top must be circular in shape, should be not less than 300mm and not exceed 410mm in diameter.

The maximum depth allowed is 250mm.

N.B. - the solid base used for strengthening purposes on some baskets is allowed. Full and Half baskets may also have flat bottoms, solid bases and straight sides.

PELARGONIUMS (Geraniums) - OPEN TO ALL GUIDANCE NOTES FOR SHOWING PELARGONIUMS

- 1. ALL CLASSES TO BE JUDGED UNDER PAGS National Rules for Judging.
- 2. The diameter of the pot is the inside measurement as near to the top of the pot as possible.
- 3. A MINIATURE is a plant in a pot not exceeding (90mm) in diameter with the plant in proportion to the pot, and flowers and leaves in proportion to the plant. Maximum height of foliage above the pot is (127mm).
- 4. A DWARF is a plant in a pot exceeding (90mm) but not exceeding (120mm) in diameter with the plant in proportion to the pot, and flowers and leaves in proportion to the plant. Maximum height of foliage above pot is (178mm).
- 5. A BASIC is a plant in a pot exceeding (120mm) but not exceeding (155mm) in diameter with the plant in proportion to the pot and flowers and leaves in proportion to the plant.
- 6. The term DISTINCT shall mean "obviously visually different".
- 7. Unless otherwise stated, plants should be shown in pots NOT exceeding the above sizes.
- 8. All plants must have been the property of the exhibitor for at least three months prior to the show. All plants must be shown in the pot size in which they have been grown. All plants must be shown in terracotta coloured pots except for entries in Beginner and Novice.
- 9. A BEGINNER is a competitor who has never won a First, Second or Third prize for Pelargoniums at any recognised Pelargonium Show.
- 10. A NOVICE is a competitor who has never won a First prize for Pelargoniums at any recognised Pelargonium show, with the exception of a beginners class.
- 11. All plants should be free from pests and diseases. Any plant considered by the Judges to be carrying such will be removed from the hall.
- 12. A FULL HANGING BASKET should be TOP planted only, and may contain more than one plant. Growth should fill the centre and top of the basket and surge over the edge in a sweeping cascade. Uniform growth with an abundance of healthy foliage and flower and should continue to at least the depth of the basket, and be evenly distributed from the crown to the end of the trailing growths. The exhibit is to be viewed from the top and sides when displayed in an elevated position. The container should not be visible when viewed at eye level.
 - The basket must be of open mesh construction and be commercially manufactured as a hanging basket. The top must be circular in shape, should be not less than 300mm and not exceed 410mm in diameter. The maximum depth allowed is 250mm.

N.B. - the solid base used for strengthening purposes on some baskets is allowed. Full and Half baskets may also have flat bottoms, solid bases and straight sides.

NOTE: PAGS Gold and Silver certificates MAY be awarded at Judges Discretion.

Trauma Teddy knitting pattern

Ths pattern is simple and can make good use of small pieces of wool.

You will need

- · No 10 (31/4mm) needles
- · Double knitting wool in four colours:
 - o Colour 1 for the head and paws
 - o Colour 2 for the trousers
 - o Colour 3 for the jumper
 - o Colour 4 for the scarf
- Stuffing Please stuff the teddy with either polyester or other healthy padding. Foam rubber is not recommended as babies or young children might chew it.
- · Needle and thread

Note Do not use buttons or beads as they may be a hazard to young children.

Instructions

- 1 Cast on 10 garter stitches main colour.
- 2 KNIT 10 rows and CONTINUE in garter stitch for 30 rows in trouser colour. Leave on spare needle and make another leg in the same way.
- 3 KNIT across all 20 stitches and work 16 rows.
- 4 CHANGE to jumper colour and KNIT 24 rows.
- 5 CHANGE to main colour for head and also
- CHANGE to stocking stitch 51/2 inches (14cm).
- 6 CHANGE to jumper colour and KNIT 24 rows.
- 7 CONTINUE teddy in reverse order and cast off.
- 8 STITCH down the sides of the head. With jumper colour, pick up 8 stitches either side of the neck join (16 in all) and KNIT 20 rows.



9 CHANGE to main colour and KNIT 10 rows for paws and cast off.

For the scarf

- 1 Cast on 75 stitches in colour 4. KNIT 4 rows and cast off.
- 2 Tie scarf on teddy at the back of the neck, close to the jumper edge. Don't sew down at the front.3 Turn right side out and SEW diagonal top
- corners for ears before stuffing.

 4 SEW up teddy leaving opening in crotch to stuff.
- **5** STUFF the teddy then run a thread through the knitting around the neck to draw it in.
- 6 SEW a happy face using stem or back stitch.
