SOBIC Archive 2003 Competition Winners

The entrants in the Complete Book category showed great skills beyond just binding. There were fine examples of wood engraving, dyeing, marble paper making, typesetting, printing, hand made paper making, writing, illustrating, and poetry to name but a few. The wide range of skills displayed were impressive, to say the least.

The judges felt that the entries generally showed an excellent holistic approach. The winning bindings were a careful blend of the book content, the binding and box as a whole concept.

COMPETITION REPORT - by Stuart Brockman, Competition Organizer

This year's competition saw 72 books being entered by 55 entrants, with a very even split between Professional and Non-Professional Binders. The entrants came from all over the world, including the UK, USA, Canada, Argentina, Australia, Estonia, The Netherlands, Germany and Belgium.

The entries were not evenly distributed across the categories, 30 books being entered in the Fine Binding category, 20 in the Cased binding, 15 in The Complete Book and 7 in the Restored/conserved.

All the bindings were exhibited at the SoB Biennial Education & Training Conference at Reading University 17-20th July, 2003. The bindings made an impressive and colourful display with many different ideas, concepts and skills being shown.

I am grateful to all the entrants who put in so much effort to complete their bindings and went to great expense to deliver their books to my home address.



One of the things remarked upon by the judges was that the difference in standard between the Professional binders' work and that of the amateurs was not always clear.

Book covered in full dark maroon leather, silk endleaves with a second endpaper made using fragments of original banknotes. Onlays cut from original banknotes, gold tooled lines and black goatskin onlays.

This was found to be a very well conceived binding whose concept works well and fits the contents perfectly. The work was obviously painstakingly carried out very neatly producing a fantastic result.

An outstanding binding, which displays very highly skilled gold tooling.



Covered in full beige goatskin, multi-sectional, flat back with flush cut binding with fore-edge flap. Hand printed endpapers, edge decoration with direct mono prints and gold leaf.

The unusual use of gold tooling combined with sculptured boards, muted leather and fore-edge flap is a delight.

Sewn on 7 tapes, edges coloured with acrylic, double endbands covered in lacunose style goatskin, yellow goatskin doublures with blue and red onlays, blind tooling.

This binding, whose concept depicts the contents of the book beautifully, with it's colourful figurative design using this binders trade mark technique, is a true delight.

Sewn on textile tapes laced into boards. Boards ground in the shape of waves, double headbands, doublures of hand coloured thin pigskin with appliquă and embroidery with silk and metal thread, lettering printed by plate.

Tiina's binding was difficult in concept and the judges were particularly taken with the use of colourful endpapers against the dark black goatskin leather boards.

This is a small binding which was simple and well executed. The judges loved the feel of the book and found the whole package to be superbly crafted. The design is striking and the contents original.





Contents - A selection of rhyming Haiku about the plight of the Minotaur, written and illustrated by Gerald Nason. Pen and ink on handmade paper.

Mel impressed the judges with his beautifully made and conceived binding, which was found to be appropriate to the text. The binding was well planned and brilliantly executed.





This binding showed an excellent holistic approach. The judges found it to be in harmony with the text and loved the simple but effective nature, which complimented the beautiful wood engravings found inside.





This binding showed an incredible piece of craftsmanship – described by one of the judges as a labour of love!



A superb binding of Genesis showing innovative ideas with different materials.



This is a very slick little book with a simple yet incredibly well executed use of materials.



This was found to be an equally precise binding with excellent use of contrasting colours.



Treatment: Spine leather removed, boards re-attached with cotton, new endbands sewn on, spine re-lined, book re-backed with green calf, original spine replaced, corners consolidated and repaired, inner joints repaired, gold and leather re-touched.

This work was a very neat re-back which showed considerable skill and attention to detail.

Restored/ Conserved Binding

SECOND PRIZE

THE WORKS OF JOSEPHUS Restored/conserved by Dominic Riley Author: n/a

Treatment: Book re-backed with Goatskin preserving original spine. Corners consolidated and repaired. Leather and gold cleaned and retouched.

This restoration piece was found to be very sympathetic and housed in a very well made and appropriate protective box.
