WORDS FROM WOCA

The last year has continued to be challenging for WOCA. As we emerged from restrictions in autumn 2021, we were plunged back into them with the emergence of the Omicron variant around Christmas time, reducing our income from room hire substantially in December, January and February. Since February, income has been gradually increasing and we are optimistic that by the end of the year we will be operating at somewhere close to the level we were at pre-pandemic. However, like everyone, we face new financial challenges around gas and electricity costs.

It was great to reboot the West Oxford Fun Day this summer – it really felt like everyone needed to have some fun and it was great to see so many of you there! Thanks again to all the volunteers for their efforts. Local events such as the Fun Day wouldn't be possible without you!

The amazing success of the Oxford City Larder, saving tonnes of food from landfill and offering people affordable groceries, has been another wonderful development. It is currently the second largest Larder in Oxford.

These and other initiatives can only be supported if we are able to cover our running costs with a bit to spare.

We are asking that those of you who receive the Winter Fuel Allowance, and do not rely on it and do not already donate it to other charities that you support, to think of WOCA. WEST SIDE STORIES

You don't have to live here for long to understand that West Oxford really is an idyllic, rural, pastoral area, embedded in fields and countryside. People move here to rent, and they stay, they find somewhere to buy. Or they came back - West Side Stories moved back to West Oxford after first living in Henry Road in 1976!

West Oxford is a bit of a well-kept secret, and West Side Stories wonders whether many at the City Council, and other decision makers, actually understand the real nature, and the specialness of West Oxford. There is a concern though that with respect to many matters, decision-makers are not aware of the real nature of West Oxford and what makes it a lovely place to live; and that therefore they may make decisions that will result in the loss of the special characteristics of West Oxford.

ILLUSTRATED TALK: 150 YEARS OF THROUGH THE LOOKING-GLASS AND WHAT ALICE FOUND IN WEST OXFORD


St Frideswide's Church, 20 October 2022 at 6:30pm. Suggested donation on entry to cover costs: £5

Following the success of the Alice's Day talks at St Frideswide's Church in July, resident local historian and author, Mark Davies, a trustee of the Lewis Carroll Society, will speak about some of the local associations with Alice in Wonderland.

The focus will be the intriguing story of a free-standing door in the church which was made for an East London mission church sponsored by Christ Church. The main panel shows St Frideswide in a boat on the Thames. It was carved, as Mark's new research shows, by two of Alice Liddell's sisters.

The door somehow survived the Blitz, even though the mission church itself (the inspiration for the TV series 'Call the Midwife') did not. Come and hear the story of the Liddell Door; of Oxford's patron saint and her 'Treacle Well'; and some previously unknown pertinent (and impertinent!) limericks by Lewis Carroll as part of St Frideswide's Church's 150th-anniversary celebrations.

OXFORD FLOOD ALLEVIATION SCHEME

Earlier this year we submitted the planning application for the Oxford Flood Alleviation Scheme to Oxfordshire County Council and they held a consultation on our proposals in April. We have now received a request for further information from them, which is quite normal for a project of this size. Once we have submitted this additional information the council will run a 30-day consultation on the newly submitted information, before considering it alongside the rest of the application.

Alongside this we expect to make a separate planning application for the removal of some of excavated material by rail. Use of rail will depend on gaining planning permission to access the sidings, their availability and trains at the time of construction, and agreements with the operator of the sidings.

We also expect to submit our Compulsory Purchase Order (CPO) for the land needed to build the scheme later this year.

Subject to obtaining all approvals, including planning permission and our CPO, we currently anticipate construction to begin in 2024.

LOVE FOOTBALL? INTERESTED IN PLAYING WOMEN'S FOOTBALL?

This year, a small group of women in west Oxford have begun meeting regularly to play football in Botley Park.

We are thinking about arranging some more sessions in the autumn and would like to involve more women if we can. The sessions last for about 50-60 minutes and are a combination of training activities and a short, small-sided match (3- or 4-a-side). They are aimed primarily at women in west Oxford, aged 40 and above, although this age threshold is flexible!

Worried about fuel bills and keeping warm?

With energy bills rocketing and the climate in crisis, LCWO's top 5 energy-busting tips can help you save money and cut emissions:

- Keep your hot water hot. If you have a hot water tank, make sure it is insulated - it's easy and cheap to fit a tank jacket if it isn't. Also, if you can reach them, wrap your hot water pipes, carrying water around your home, in insulation tape.
- Don't overheat your home. Keep your thermostat around 18-21 degrees. Turn the heating off overnight and when you're out.
- Save on lighting. Replace old light bulbs and get into the habit of turning lights off when you leave the room.
- **Ditch the dryer.** Use a washing line to dry clothes outside when you can. If you have to dry things inside, use a rack, not the radiators; put the rack in a room near an open window with the door to the rest of your space closed.
- Stop your home leaking heat. Stick reflective panels or foil behind your radiators to reflect heat back into the room.

LCWO is giving away free radiator foil and draft excluder tape to West Oxford residents. If you'd like some, get in touch with **Mim** at **mim@lcwo.org.uk**.

Low Carbon West Oxford launches report 'Not-So-Super-Stores? Are the big retailers in our West Oxford community helping or hindering climate action?'

LCWO was proud to launch the findings of its work on a retailer sustainability scorecard in Oxfordshire's Great Big Green Week, at an event at the Museum of Oxford. Retailers Currys and Waitrose attended the event, as well as the Chair of Oxfordshire County Council and 3 key members of the City Council Cabinet.

Oxford's "big brand" retailers must improve their efforts to help the city become cleaner and greener

As Oxford begins its annual Great Big Green Week, a report by award-winning charity Low Carbon West Oxford (LCWO) finds that some big retailers with local stores are not doing enough to help the city meet its carbon reduction targets.

Large retailers provide goods and jobs to local communities but are also responsible for roughly one quarter of the UK's consumption-based greenhouse gas emissions. They can also have physical impacts on local communities - for example in West Oxford, which faces air pollution, serious congestion and remains at risk of flooding.





Oxford City Council has committed to reducing the city's emissions to net zero by 2040 and local public and private sector organisations and communities need to play their full part with urgent action.

Yet these giants, who average an annual turnover of £2.5bn and 340 stores each, are, on average, fulfilling less than half the sustainability standards we rated them against.

LCWO reviewed 16 big retailers who all run branches in West Oxford and found that a third of them have no publicly-stated "net zero" targets and about the same number have not made any publicly-announced emissions reductions to date.

Four of the sixteen companies - Carpetright, Schmidt, Home Bargains and Wren Kitchens - fulfilled less than 15% of the sustainability metrics we scored them on. This suggests they are taking no or at best minimal action to address the climate emergency.

Only one local manager, from Halfords, responded to LCWO's request to discuss the review of its "green" policies and practises, and that was to say that he was unable to help due to being part of a larger organisation. None of the other 15 replied.

When the LCWO contacted each retailer at its Head Office, only four responded to requests for information. "This suggests that the vast majority of retailers have non-existent methods to engage with local residents," said Mim Saxl, LCWO Lead Programme Manager...





..."They seem to disempower their local managers and give them limited decision-making space. We found them in the main to have no, or very limited, interest in or awareness of local issues."

But there are also positive examples of good practice. As well as setting a target of fully recyclable or reusable own brand packaging by 2023, Currys proactively helps customers to repair broken items and recycle electrical waste.

Aldi has a strong history on carbon reduction measures, and all their stores use renewable energy. Their Botley Road branch installed community-owned solar PV through collaboration with West Oxford Community Renewables (WOCoRe) and is one of their 390 stores generating solar power.

As well as being an early adopter of net zero and science-based targets, Screwfix stands out as one of only a few companies to have clear measurement and targets of scope 3 emissions - all of the emissions that are generated by the production and distribution of the products they sell before they get to the store and after they are sold.

With a net zero target, interim science-based targets, and measurement of supply chain emissions all in place, Pets At Home provide comprehensive and transparent reporting on their waste management, which is unusual.





Mim Saxl, Lead Programme Manager for LCWO says, "Local residents set up LCWO after the unprecedented summer flooding in our area in 2007 to work with neighbours, organisations and businesses to help reduce our community's contribution to the climate crisis. There are more than 100 businesses and retailers in the local retail and business parks who we have tried to engage in the past. While a few have responded very positively, most have unfortunately not. We hope that the scorecard will help show retailers that locals – and shoppers – care not just about what they sell but also about what they are doing about their carbon and environmental footprints."

Phil Bloomer, local resident and executive director of the Business and Human Rights Resource Centre says, "We West Oxford residents live on the flood plain and feel the consequences of lack of action by business on climate. The least we ask from companies, which are our neighbours is that they take the risks of climate catastrophe as seriously as we do. They need to play their part and learn quickly from other leading companies that act as good neighbours and responsible business."

Investing in Botley Road - Mission Street update on repurposing retail units for new workspace

This summer we learned a good deal from talking to the West Oxford community about our plans for redeveloping the DFS and Carpetright site on Botley Road. We're grateful to everyone who took part in our consultation or came to our public exhibitions on 21 and 23 July. Thank you for sharing your views and feedback.

As I write, we're working hard to take the comments from the consultation through a design review process with our architect and planning team. We want to make the building the best it can be, adapting the design to reduce its impact and considering how we can apply the valued feedback and ideas we received about ways for the development to make a positive contribution to the local community.

The outcome of this process is going to be a question of balance. We want to bring forward a successful and sustainable regeneration of the site that creates a great place to work as well as a great addition to Botley Road. We want the scheme to result in the best use of the land and to deliver benefits ranging from jobs and the economy through to improved cycling and walking

We'll share updates via our website - www.investinginbotleyroad.co.uk - and continue the conversations with the local councilors and the community.

We look forward to submitting a planning application once that work is completed.

Just down the road, we're making good progress with the re-fit of the old Argos building so that too can have a more productive use as high quality workspace. The contractor team at Willmott Dixon expect the job to take approximately 12 months in total meaning we hope to have this smart new workspace ready for occupation by July 2023. We appreciate everyone's patience while that work continues.

I look forward to working with you in the most constructive way possible and to seeing many of you again soon.

The olives are hand-picked early in the harvest season and milled to a strict standard on the very same day. Early harvest olives yield less oil but produce a more intense flavour and aroma: medium-flavoured, with a fruity taste, a grassy scent and a peppery finish.

Our olives are from ancient trees grown in Sicily by smallholdings farmers in a sustainable way. The trees are still tended to using traditional methods: organically, without the use of pesticides or artificial irrigation systems.
